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Rebel team defends eighth Halton crown

The Rebel cross country team won the Halton County Championship last Wednesday at Kelso for its eight consecutive

year. In addition to claiming the overall school title, Georgetown was first in both the overall girls' and overall boys' categories and took four firsts and two second places of the six team divisions.

Two Rebel teams, the senior girls and midget boys, had perfect scores of ten points (where runners from one team finish in places of first, second, third and fourth). There were also three individual winners from Georgetown.

Susan Kristensen placed first in the senior girls race. Mike Wood took the medal in the midget boys race and Erik Hopkins won the junior boys race.

The fields of runners were very small at Halton's and the competition wasn't nearly the calibre as at some meets held earlier in the season in Toronto.

The Rebels did prove however that they are still the best in Halton County taking home 23 of a possible 36 medallions awarded.
