## Red Cross pauses to say 'thanks'

The Red Cross target of \$21,000 for its 1982 campaign has nearly been reached, thanks to 500 canvassers in rural and residential areas.

Thanking all the volunteers involved in the campaign that topped last year's income by nearly \$3,000, campaign chairman John Wickens said considering the state of the economy "this should be regarded a highly commendable effort".

Over 130 people crowded into the North Halton Golf and Country Club basement for the 43rd annualmeeting of the Georgetown Red Cross last Tuesday night.

Thanking executive members, retiring officers and volunteers who keep the Red Cross going, president Erica Thompson reported 1981 was a most satisfying year for the branch.


