League 'is cooking'

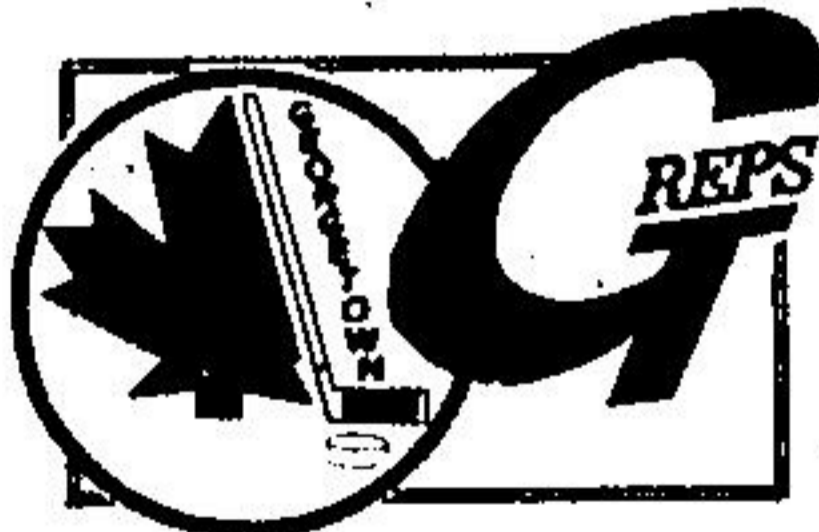
