The Georgelown cross country team won the Peel-Hullon championship last Wednesday for its eighth consecutive year and qualified all six teams (30 runners) to the provincial (OFSAA) meet to be held this Saturday.

In order to qualify for OFSAA and school must place any of its divisional teams either first or second in their district. Georgetown's midget girls, senior girls, midget boys and junior boys all won their respective divislons, while the junior girls and senior boys teams took second places

Amy Powers led the midget girls to victory in a race containing 59 runnes with a strong second place finish, timing 11:22.

She was only 11 seconds behind the winner, Brenda Steenhof, from Milton, whose team placed second in the division, 22 points behind Georgelown's winning score of

Nancy Mustard was the next Rebel runner to cross the line, placing third, in a time of 11:31.

Sandy Heaton placed tenth timing 12:23, followed by Anne Coulighan in eleventh position. Linda Wenham came 13th and Michelle Barnard placed 23rd.

In the junior girls race of 64 runners Lynn Macphall was the first runner to cross the line for Georgetown in third place, with a time of 14:48.

The Rebels' total of 42 was only nine points behind Nelson's winning score of 33 points.

HEATON FOURTH Fiona Heaton ran well for Georgetown placing fourth, and timing 15:54. She was followed by Shawn Langdon, 15th, and Karen Pepper, 20th.

Laura Groskorth, a first year midget did very well in the junior division, finishing 23rd. Paula Hansen was 43rd and Anne Ramsay came 50ti.

Georgetown's senior girls had the lowest (best) point total of the day, with a score of 15. Second place Clarkson's score of 29 points, which would normally be a very good score, was no match for the senior girl powerhouse from Georgetown.

MARCINIUK FIRST Sandra Marciniuk led the girls to their victory by winning the race clocking a swift 20:19 - a good 29 seconds in front of the second place runner from Clarkson.

Susan Kristensen was the next runner in for. Georgetown, placing third, in a time of 20:51. Kim Newcombe flew to a fourth place finish timing a quick 20:58. Debble Newman placed seventh,

timing 21:25 and Jen Pepper came in for a strong eleventh position. The race contained 47 competitors.

The midget boys cleaned their division, claiming victory with a low score of only 20 points. Even second place Milton trailed by 53 points.

WOOD - BRAUND, 1-2 Following Mike Wood's win of a 17:39 clocking was Pat Braund, finishing in a solid second position, timing 18:05. Greg Mackenzie followed ten seconds late in fourth place. Behind him came Darren Boudreau, 13th, Norm Macphall, 50th and Graham Shepherd, 72nd.

In the junior boys victory, the Rebels, scoring 35, had a good 25 point spread on second place Nelson, totalling 60 points.

Erik Hopkins, who won the event, booted to a 20:27 clocking. Behind him came Chris Forguson, sixth, at 21:45, and Paul Watts, ninth, timing 22:09.

They were followed by David Banks, 19th, Bob Lovegrove, 21st and Ken Hesse, 35th.

In one of the more competitive divisions, the senior boys team battled illness, injury and doubt to qualify for the provincials by placing a solid second in their division.

The team's score of 68 points trailed an incredibly strong team from Nelson (who placed first) by 38 points, but was a comfortable (?) 12 points ahead of third place Clarkson who totalled 80 points. Georgetown's third and fourth runners. who fought injury and illness respectively (as well as agonizing pain) still somehow managed to finish the race.
