As promised last week, the special offer with exciting news.

The regional deer hunt went well even though the "Hunt Opposition" claims that it was not advertised and "no one knew about it". Their claim is that it was kept quiet by the local politicians, but the fact is they (the opposition) were just not on the job.

Once the hunt was under way they got off their duffs and started to complain. I talked personally to the Ministry representatives and there were only one or two minor trespass complaints and they were resolved by phone or a visit.

One hundred and twenty three deer were harvested by the end of the three day hunt. There may be an increase in this figure as a final tally is made and reports are all in, but it will not go above 150.

A RESOURCE

Deer are a part of a renewable resource and with proper management they will continue to flourish and should be harvested.

I will not condescend to reply to the so called Hunt Opposition even though they are of a malevolent nature.

However, for those other responsible citizens that are concerned about the hunt and its related questions, the hunt is very tightly controlled.

Also the discontinuation of the "Back Patch" on the 1982 hunting license was effort by the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters.

The patches were too hard to see in the field and were of little or no value. That cost is now saved for wildlife work. If you have a problem with hunters, and there may be some, call the MNR or local police. They will respond rapidly to any such call. Details on the hunt were in last Friday's Herald Weekend, and as stated the full report will be given when compiled by the Ministry.

The Brown Trout is finally being stocked again in Ontario waters. Many people have been working to this end for many years.

However the Credit River where the urgings started, will not receive any of this stocking.

The Ganaraska River will receive about 21,000 including fall fingerlings and yearlings. Summit Lake in Tweed district, 8,000.

The Sydenham River system 19,000. Minister, Mr. Pope has committed himself to the project now and it is hoped the ministry will continue this stocking program.

Collingwood gives our Raiders the Blues

Collingwood Shipbuilder coach Daryl Sly may finally have turned the tables on his Georgetown Raider opponents.

The Shipbuilders were in Georgetown Friday night to battle for the Intermediate leadership and they left town boasting a 7-5 win over the Raiders.

Coach Sly commented after the game that in years previous Collingwood were the youthful team of the league with the Raiders always providing a full complement of experienced veterans.

Now Collingwood has the edge in the veteran department and the Shipbuilders took full advantage of it in their game Friday.

"We knew their captain (Raider defenceman John Saunders) was out with an injury so we wanted to rush their defence," Sly said.

As well as playing a smart game matching lines, Sly had his team skating and passing well against the Georgetown squad.

Sly feels his team has more experience and depth in their defence and goaltending positions this year.

Still, Georgetown remains the hardest team to beat for Collingwood, the Shipbuilder coach said.

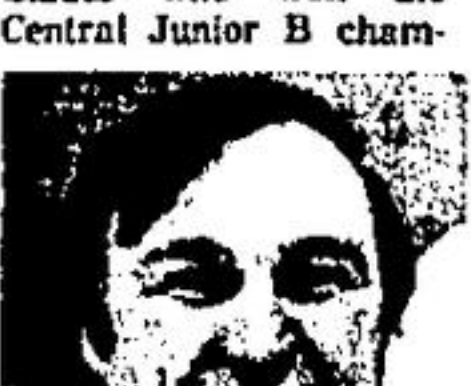
After the game general manager Don Fendley said he wasn't particularly alarmed at the result because the Raiders didn't lose the game - they gave it away by making mistakes.

To compound their poor showing, the Raiders had three key veterans off the lineup: John Saunders, Gary Ford and Gary McFadyen. Saunders and Ford are injured while Gary McFadyen had a cold.

Collingwood started the game off with a goal in the first minute by winger George Wilson.

The Raiders came back with a goal by one of their newest members, Jim Long, a right defenceman who played for the Thornhill Thunderbirds last year.

Bill Gerri, another new Raider face, assisted on the goal. Gerri played last year for the Oakville Blades - who won the Central Junior B championship last year.

At the 13:42 mark of the period Georgetown took the lead when Tim Turner received a pass from behind the net by Tim Ampleford at the deep slot where he let go for a goal.

Ampleford made his presence felt by assisting on two goals and helping out his wingers with crisp passes throughout the game.

Collingwood controlled much of the latter 10 minutes of the period with their swift skating and sharp passing.

In the second period the Shipbuilders broke open for five goals, peppering Brad Miller with 14 shots.

However, it was the Raiders who started out quickly, notching two goals in the first two minutes. Coach Daryl Sly for Collingwood considered changing goaltender Harry Van Bilsen in favor of Brad Steele, but Steele stayed on the bench.

Then Tim Turner connected on a power play drive from Tim Ampleford and Gerri Schaefer.

Every team makes playoffs

Even though the Georgetown Chrysler Raiders voted against it, the Intermediate A league has decided on allowing every team an equal shot in the playoffs.

The Herald has learned from its Midland affiliate paper that each of the six Intermediate A teams will be granted a playoff berth. The team finishing first will play in a best five of nine series.

The other two playoff series will be four of seven with the first series getting a bye in the second round.

The championship series will be a best four of seven series. When asked, Raider general manager Don Fendley said the Georgetown representatives voted against the decision because it wouldn't improve the competition.

For example, Fendley said there is no incentive to play your best players during the first part of the season.

In other Raider news, veteran of last year's Hardy Cup, Scott McKenzie, is talking to Georgetown about signing a card. Gord Cullen of Dundas St. A's is also inquiring about the prospects of joining the Raiders.

with the Dixie A club, before coming to Georgetown as a Junior B Gemini.

Living with Bill Large of Georgetown on Irwin Crescent, who billeted him when he was with the Gemini, Guy presently works at Molson's brewery in Toronto.

In the immediate future, Guy is working hard to keep his spot on the Raiders' lineup. He's fully aware that Al Woods, once the Georgetown club's leading scorer in mid-season was let go two years ago.

The Christmas airlift is a worrisome preoccupation with Guy and a number of his linemates, Guy says. Traditionally, Georgetown has been able to recruit gradually and bring in highly talented players around Christmas, often leaving local players without a team to play for.

MORE TALENT
The recent signing of Doug Fry and Tim Ampleford with Scott McKenzie in camp practising, signals the return of more high profile and experienced talent.

But there are indications that the fast skating and hustle of players like Glen Murray and Guy Cormier will prove that youth is required on the 1982-83 edition of the Raiders.

Otherwise, Guy could have been down in the International League's Toledo hockey club's training camp, vying for a spot there.

If he has a good year with the Raiders Guy hopes to land a spot on a European hockey team or perhaps he will try out with an IHL team.

The abundance of contacts from Georgetown hockey people like Rick Daigle from West Germany and Gary Ford could eventually help Guy find a prosperous future in hockey.

Guy wants to prove he belongs. While working out at a local health club when not on the job at Molsons, Guy says simply and with conviction, "I devote most of my time to hockey."

Cormier will still feel the pressure to produce on the ice this season, but he's enjoying hockey again - and there have been no broken promises...

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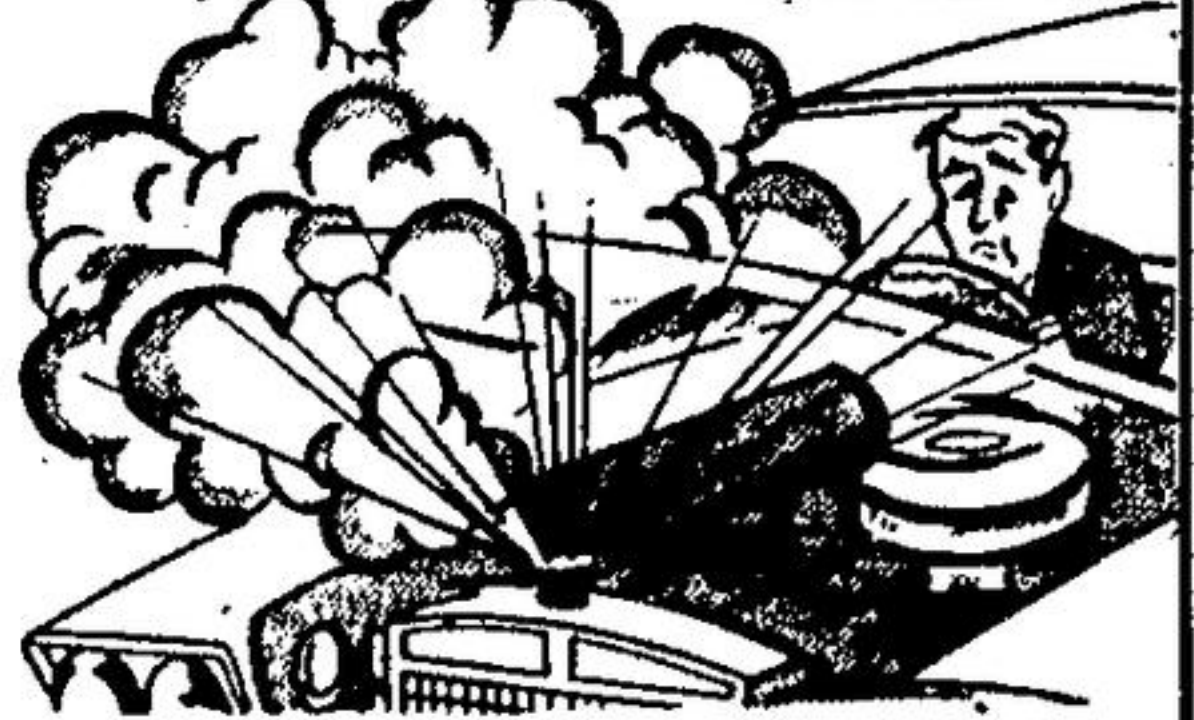
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
