Current events were handled by Mrs. F. Brown and convenors gave two minute items. Mrs. J. W. Noble asked to be relieved of her office due to illness in the family.

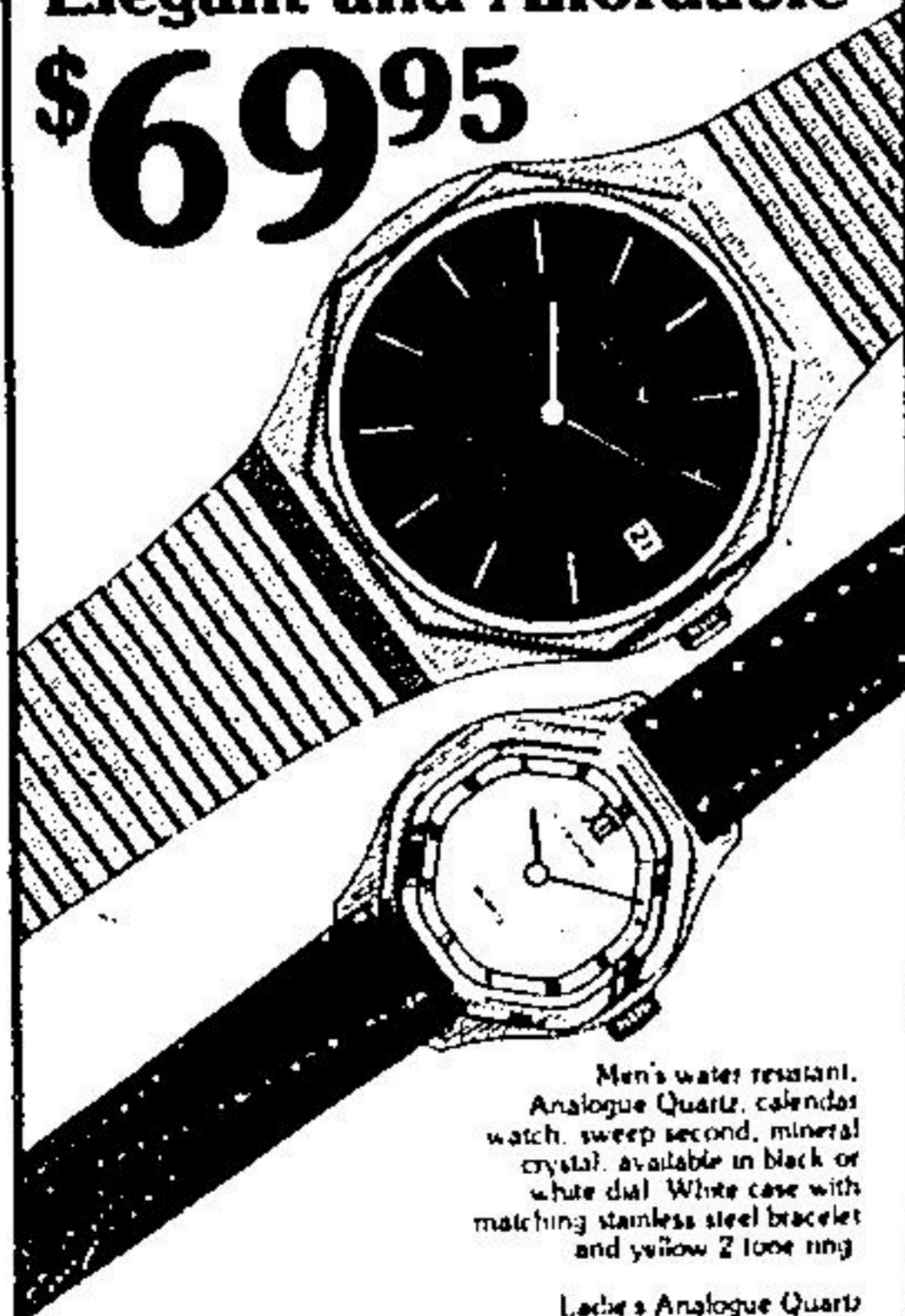
Convenor of Education and Cultural Activities, Mrs. Hannah gave a
