Weather-flex rubberized track costs \$175,000

Athletes in the running for new track

A new group has formed in Georgetown with the intention of exploring the possibilities of building a track and field facility at the Georgetown District High School.

Chaired by GDHS viceprincipal Bill Tom, a track steering committee met Wednesday night in their second organizational session.

Fifteen members in attendance volunteered to help in three different sub-committees to explore questions on design of the track, funding and use of the facilities.

Representatives on the steering committee are mostly from the public school system. Physical education head at GDHS. Fred Kotani was present and he made a presentation on some preliminary queries concerning the feasiblity of the project.

Cross country and track coaches from GDHS, Karen Cosgrove and Donna Metcalfe were present

along with Pat Burroughs Paul Hynds and Brian Cosgrove of Stewartlown and Centennial Public School.

PARENTS also in attendance were interested parents of Georgetown runners and Councillor Marilyn Serjeantson.

A presentation was made on the type of track facility available and at what cost. Cross Country coach from Centennial. Brian Cosgrove, told the

group three types of tracks were available. ranging in cost from \$60,000 to \$500,000.

The committee decided that the track most suitable to the needs of the Georgetown community would be the "middle of the road" track facility. costing approximately \$175,000.

The decision by the group was based on research and inquiries Mr. Cosgrove presented.

Materials available in-

clude crushed stone on asphalt and varying types of synthetic rubber.

One of the cheapest types of synthetic rubber tracks costs \$60,000 and it contains some asphalt and a liquid synethic rubber spray coating.

The problem with this type is that it is soft and hot in warm weather and correspondingly hard in cold weather. Another drawback is the high maintenance costs compared to the more expensive models, Mr. Cosgrove said.

The most expensive type was immediately rejected because of the \$300,000 minimum required to construct the track.

The weather-flex rubberized track approved by the steering committee in their preliminary findings is guaranteed against delamination, decompo sition and deterioration.

The track is an all-weather facility and it is

approved by the NCAA (National College Athletic Association). There are 35 such tracks like it in Ontario, including Queens and Western. It takes little time to construct and is considered to be maintenance free. Further research of track selection will be carried out by the design subcommittee.

The committee members agreed that resource persons from different Continued on Page 9
