 Communications, transportation and high technology electronics are also Canadian strengths to be capitalized upon.

frontation doesn't work. Mr. Mulroney predicted manpower retaining to be the most urgent human challenge of the 1980s.

Canada needs to immediately begin sending "clear signals to the international investment community" that Canada

is again a "good and honorable place to do business" because huge pools of capital are available if we regain the trust of the international community.

The Foreign Investment Review Agency (FIRA) needs scrapping, he says. While the principle of an overview and a degree of control over events in the Canadian economy may

be acceptable, present economic conditions make job creation more important.

"Today my concern is not who owns the plant that produces the job," he says, "but rather how can we attract anyone to build the plant that produces the job."

He would also cut all retroactivity and discrimination, including the

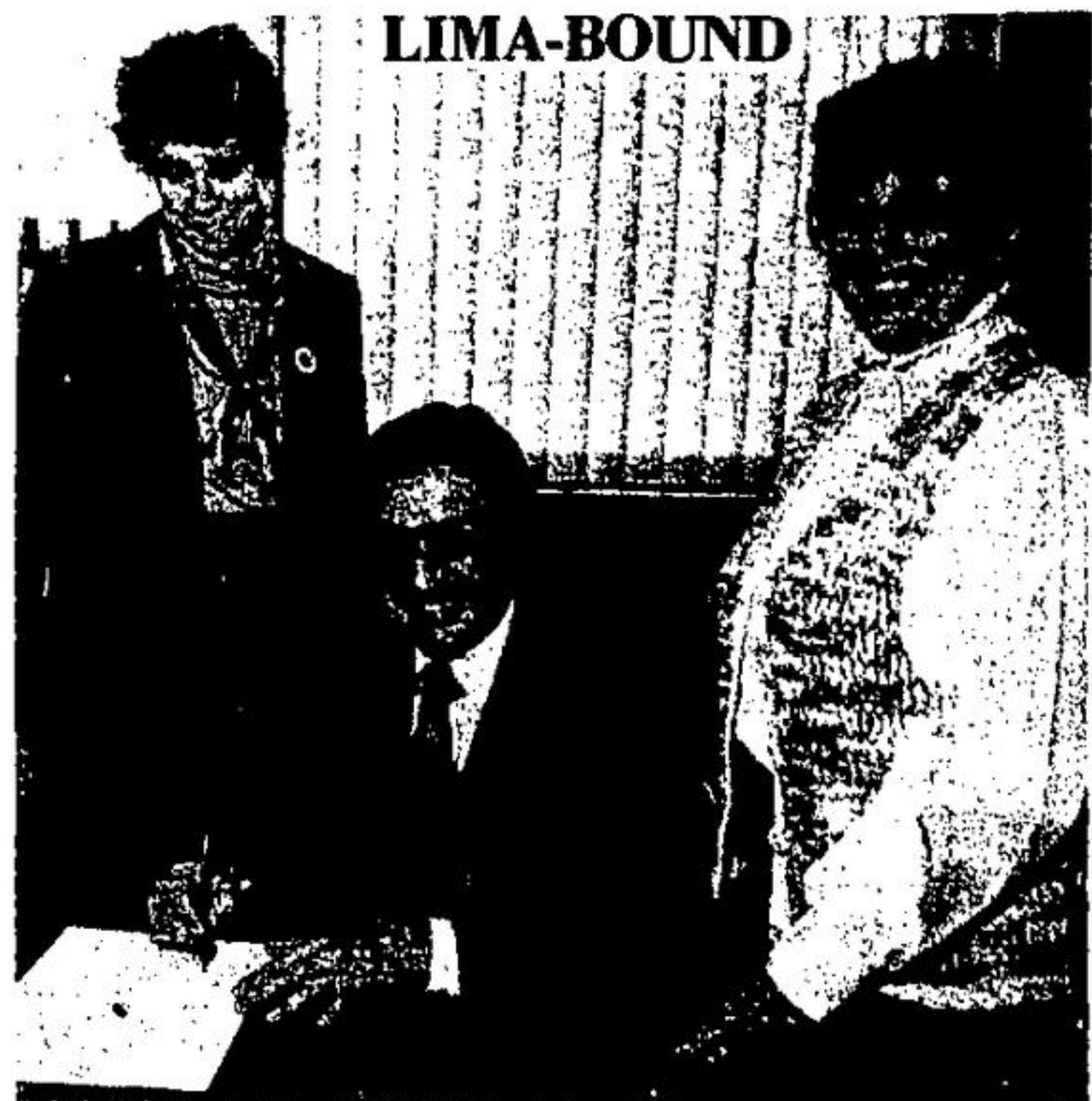
back-in provisions of the national energy policy. Foreign capital must be welcomed with open arms, a genuine sense of fairness and confidence that it can be controlled for the benefit of Canadians.

Mr. Mulroney would also examine the idea of allowing municipalities to issue tax-free bonds for capital projects designed to create employment.

Mr. Mulroney urged a cut in government spending everywhere and in every circumstance until taxpayers feel the government is using their money wisely again.

Mr. Mulroney was guest speaker at a party fundraiser celebrating the 10th anniversary of Halton MP Otto Jelinek's election to Parliament.

## Holiday care for seniors seen as breakthrough

Halton District Health Council and Halton Centennial Manor have jointly announced a trial Vacation Care Program for elderly people in Halton. The program began on a trial basis

Monday (Nov. 15). The program will operate from Halton Centennial Manor and is designed for elderly people living in the community with their families. This program will be available for

a short-term holiday period and will enable the family to go away on holiday secure in the knowledge that the relative is being properly looked after.

In the beginning, until

demand has been established, the cost will be \$31 a day, including meals and nursing care.

Applicants must have their family physician complete the Halton Regional Assessment Form before admission. Enquiries should be directed to Richard Kaufman, administrator at Halton Centennial Manor in Milton, 878-4141.

The District Health Council has encouraged the maintenance of elderly patients in their homes in the community but has recognized the need to provide vacation relief for both the elderly patient and the care givers.

This program was further identified in the council's Care of the Elderly in Halton Chapter published in May, 1981. Until now it has not been possible to introduce the program because of the shortage of suitable facilities and support staff. If this program proves successful it will probably be retained on a year-round basis and its scope of operation will be broadened.

## One more charged in resident's death

Peel regional police have charged a fifth suspect in the Aug. 21 shooting death of Anthony Babakos of Georgetown.

Charged with first degree murder is Toris Lambros, 38, of Brampton.

Mr. Babakos, who lived with his wife and children on Windsor Road, was shot twice in the chest by a masked man in his mid-20s who entered the Vega Steakhouse restaurant in Brampton, which Mr. Babakos owned, and asked for the victim by name. Mr. Babakos was taken to Peel Memorial Hospital, where he died about an hour later.

Subsequently charged

in the killing were Lawrence John Stocking, 23, and Brenda Lee Poulin, 23, who is now about seven months pregnant.

The two Bramptonians face first degree murder charges in Brampton court March 1.

Ms. Poulin was last week denied bail by the Ontario Supreme Court.

Charged with armed robbery along with Mr.

Stocking is John MacLeod, 27, also of Brampton. Charles Arseneau, 23, is charged with selling a restricted weapon without a permit. Their preliminary hearing is set for Dec. 23.

These charges stem from an armed robbery which took place at the Vega restaurant ten days before Mr. Babakos was killed.

### Thieves take stereo

Stereo equipment valued at \$5,000 was removed from a Nassagaweya home last week. Halton regional police said the home was entered by thieves who forced a rear window.
