Eye surgeon black belt speaks here

Dr. David Smith, M.D., widely travelled and wellknown Baha'i speaker, will be at the Georgetown Cultural Centre next Tuesday (Nov. 23) at 8 p.m., for the third of the three-part series on the Baha'i faith.

Dr. Smith's talk will be based on the Baha'i pattern for world civilization and its implications for the future of mankind. Baha'is believe that the eventual destiny of man is glorious, fulfilling the reason for his creation. How this is to be achieved will be part of Dr. Smith's address.

David Smith is an eye surgeon serving on the staff of the Hospital for Sick Children, as well as assistant professor at the University of Toronto (opthalmology). He was a host of the former Cable program "Baha'i News" produced in North York and shown on a number of cable TV statlons across Canada. He recently returned from a trip to Israel.

Holder of a fourth dan black belt, Dr. Smith is president of Chito-Ryu Karate organization for Canada. As teachers of karate to children since 1970, Dr. Smith and his wife try to incorporate the Baha'i teachings of selfdiscipline and respect for others. This was certainly in evidence during the recent International Baha'i Children's Conference in Montreal, in which more than 1,000 children participated. Dr. Smith was master of ceremonies at this event, demonstrating patience, humor and love, and in return gaining the children's respect and






