The government Bill treats union and non-union public sector workers differently during the control year in refusing to mandate a minimum increase of five per cent for all workers caught by this legislation. Our

We propose mandating a minimum increase of \$1,200 during the control year - such an increase is necessary for lower economic levels to keep pace with the ravages of infla-

amendments designed to convince a properly sceptical public that this government is serious about creating a five per cent world...not just for workers, but for everyone. These amendments would provide a rollback to five per cent of the increase in OHIP rates which took effect on October 1st. They would limit Ontario Hydro to a five per cent increase. And, finally, they would provide for an increase of not more than five per cent annually by landlords.

Ontario is indeed in a period of economic emergency. Half a million unemployed people are demanding action. This Bill does not provide the desperately needed jobs. In proposing a world of restraint, we believe no worker, public or private, employed or jobless, would want us to take a club to those who spend their working lives in public service. The principle of sacrifice by these employees must be accompanied by the principle of justice for each worker, and a real sense of compassion for those for whom the
