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Raiders awaken from their big sleep: Georgetown scores 19 goals in two games

Awakened from their big sleep of two weeks ago the Georgetown Chrysler Raiders accomplished something this weekend they've become accustomed to over the year - winning.

Outscoring their opponents like the Raiders of last year, the local Georgetown club defeated Midland 7-0 Friday, then embarrassed Port Elgin 12-2 at home Saturday.

Coach Gary credited the entire team with their recent victories, saying he'll have a tough time cracking the lineup when he's ready to return to the active list.

The player-coach will start skating this week. A leg injury sidelined him for several weeks.

Rearguard standout John Saunders was back playing with the team in both wins and his presence was felt even though he's not fully recovered, Ford says.

STABILIZING

Coach Ford commended Tim Ampleford's play and the stabilizing factor of defenceman Gord Cullen,

en, a newcomer with the team.

Port Elgin didn't come out fighting the way they're accustomed to doing in their own rink which surprised Ford. He says the Raiders played well at both ends with the forwards picking up their wings.

General manager Don Fendley credited the wins to "harmony within the team" and the players working together, not giving up the puck.

The hapless Port Elgin Suns never seemed to recover from their 4-1 first period abjecting. The Suns made the Raiders look extremely good at times with their hap-hazard play.

Four minutes into the opening period the Raiders started their scoring spree, connecting on a play where Barry Trood scored from Tim Turner and Gord Cullen.

TIED
At the 13:53 mark of the period Port Elgin tied the game on a goal by Steve Pette. After that the Suns couldn't manage a goal until the third period on a

power play. Bill Gerrie scored the second Raider goal on a pass from Tim Ampleford.

Turner scored his se-

cond goal of the night on a shot assisted by Scott McKenzie and John Saunders. McKenzie plays centre for the Georgetown club after he recently signed. He played last year for the Raiders.

Ron Twiss had a break-away chance and he made no mistake about the opportunity as he put the puck away, deking Popovich cleanly. Georgetown goalie Brad Miller and John Saunders assisted on the goal.

Gary McFadyen put the Raiders ahead 7-1 on a tip in from the goalmouth after Tim Ampleford fed him a perfect cross from the corner.

PERFECT
Then Ampleford let go with a perfect shot he made no mistake of from the slot on a good pass from Bill Gerrie.

In the third period Scott McKenzie scored assisted by Guy Cormier and Tim Turner.

The shot caught Popovich and the defence look-

ing the other way.

Ron Twiss then scored his second of the night short handed from John Saunders.

With 3:51 left in the game a power play goal was scored by centre Doug Fry from Glen Murray and Gord Cullen.

Tim Ampleford ended the scoring on a shot off Gary McFadyen's rebound who had a one on one break. Trailing Ampleford made sure the puck ended in the net.

Midland scoring

The Raiders have scored 19 goals in the past two games against the two teams presently tied for third place.

Brad Miller has only let in two goals in two games. In the 7-0 slaughter against Midland, Guy Cormier and Glen Murray scored two goals to pace their team while singles were earned by Steve Bronizewski, Gary McFadyen and Tim Turner.

Georgetown Gemini defenceman Jay Barwell has 14 goals in 20 games with the local Junior B hockey club, a milestone to be envied by many forwards in the Central League.

The 17-year-old grade 11 student at Georgetown District High School is having an excellent year with the Gems and has often helped out the team with his offensive talents.

Jay's secret is to try to get in position in front of the net and keep moving on the power play, he says.

A Midget-age player last season, he was the only player from the Tri County Major Midget league to be drafted by a Junior A club.

The Guelph Platters were very interested in Jay's services after he netted 17 goals and 21 assists in Midget hockey.

NO CONTRACT

After training camp this season the Platters wanted to sign him to a contract, but Jay decided he would like to pursue a career in hockey through a college scholarship.

Jay says he has talked to some schools in the United States, where he hopes to play in the Division One loop, preferably the University of New Hampshire which is eighth ranked in the country.

It was tempting to join the Platt-

ers, but a player isn't eligible to apply for a scholarship if they are professionals, Jay says.

But the chance in Guelph helped him learn that in Junior A clubs, the players can be treated in a very businesslike manner.

CONFIDENCE

The Platters also gave Jay more confidence because he didn't feel out of place against competing clubs. Jay's first sports love is hockey, although he has also been a standout football player for the GDHS in every season but this Fall.

He started his minor hockey in Regina where he was born. At age 11 Jay and his teammates won the entire Regina hockey championship then travelled to Winnipeg to win a tournament there. That year he was voted to the league's all-star team.

Five years ago Jay moved to Georgetown where he has played rep hockey ever since. During the summers he has attended hockey camps, the most recent one is Team Ranch in Caledon in which Jay instructs.

Instructors such as Bob Stapleton, Ron Willis, Laurie Boschman and Mike Gardner from the NHL provided opportunities for Jay to learn extra tips and get to know the players.

Eventually Jay would like a stab at making the NHL, because he says he likes the type of lifestyle and comradeship a professional athlete has.

But Jay also wants to pursue school in business studies or communication in university.

Coming from a family where his father was a professional athlete, Jay says he "grew up with professional athletes."

Jay's father Gord played 10 seasons for the Edmonton Eskimos in the CFL and was the youngest player (18 years) at the time to have entered the league.

SPORTS FAMILY

Gord Barwell was also a Junior A hockey player for the Saskatchewan Blades. Jay's mother Nancy and Gord Barwell were top sprinters in high school.

Jay's sister, Jody, 15 was fifth at the OFSAA hurdles last Spring. Jay says he never felt pressured by his family to become a professional athlete, but he learned from his father that it's important to do your best at all times.

After proving himself in Midget, Jay now has to keep playing well to impress the U.S. scouts that periodically watch the Central League hockey teams.

It was hard at first to play Junior B after starting at the Junior A level, but Jay has adjusted well. Last month he netted a hat trick when the coach moved him to the forward line in a game against Streetsville.
