Russiani named new Gem coach

The Georgetown Genticis hockey chib lost their head couch this week, but before the appropriate mourning period had been proclaimed, the local Junfor B team signed on veteran all-star coach Jules Russiani to fill the VECULID.

In a surprise move. Gemini coach Bob Smulders offered his resignation Tuesday, indicating work and family committments made it impossible for him to continue coaching.

The Geminis wasted no time in approaching former Actor Junior B coach Jules Russiani and convincing him to return to action. He was contacted the same night Smulder's resigned.

Russiani is a veteran of Junior B hockey, having won the all-star and Coach of the Year two years ago in the Central league.

He is remembered for his Acton team which took Burlington in seven games in the playoffs during the 1980-81 season and coaching the Sabres to a 17game win streak.

Russiani is the first Sabre coach to lead Acton in the playoffs for two consecutive years.

The Geminis also announced that veteran goal scorer Bob Dean had agreed to return to the team after a three month holdout because he wished to be traded.

Jules Russiani was instrumental in getting Dean back on the Gemini lineup because he arranged for college scholarship contacts with Dean earlier in the Fall.

Through his Streetsville contacts, Russiani was able to belp Dave McGilleway gain a scholarship last year. When Streetsville asked Russiani for any good prospects in 1982, he mentioned Dean's name,
