In Friday's mail I received a letter from John McFadyen of Agincourt. With this letter was a copy of the letter he received from the ministry and a list of 17 items of concern. These new parks will NOT allow hunting, and if you are concerned for the loss of vost areas to the hunter and fisherman, then write your MP at Queens Park, and the O.F.A.H. at P.O. Box 28, Peterborough, Ont. K9J 6Y5 or and the Muskoka-Parry Sound Hunt Camp Association, P.O. Box 1913, Huntaville, Ont. PoA 1Ko.

You must voice your opinion NOW or it will be too late. I will personally pay for and supply copies of this list of items to all who call and ask for one. 877-9290.


