

An increase of 11,350 kg, (25,000 pounds) is a huge amount and it has been stated by the Ministry of Natural Resouces that the whitefish quota for harvest by commercial fishing could be increased in quota zone No. 1 from 38,550 kg (85,000 pounds) to 49,900 kg (110,000 pounds).




