Almand's gun control shot down

MP Warren Almand's latest gun control bill has been defeated in the house. The opposition talked it out until the time ran out. Good thing, and an even better thing when Almand finally quits.

He is determined to get stricter controls in, and the anti-hunting and animal protection outfits are behind him all the way. If you have ever lived in Britain as I have, you will fight against controls that are too severe.

Whitefish stocks in Lake Simcoe are under constant scrutiny. Stocking will be started again soon, and this should continue until water quality is back to normal, or the latest type of water is stocked with a suitable fish species, and the whitefish dropped.

Whitefish quotas have been increased to the commercial netters in quota zone No. 1 of Eastern Lake Superior. An increase of 11,350 kg. (25,000 pounds) is a huge amount and it has been stated by the Ministry of Natural Resources that the whitefish quota for harvest by commercial fishing could be increased in quota zone No. 1 from 38,550 kg. (85,000 pounds) to 49,900 kg. (110,000 pounds).

MANY HANDS

The Ministry gives with one hand, and takes away with the other. The big problem is they have so many hands, and they all want to get in to the act. The Splake stocking announced for next spring is great, but it is a separate management control unit, and of course a separate species.

It seems to me, we are putting two socks on one foot. Environment minister John Robarts announced the first formal agreement between the federal government and a non-profit group to manage a National Wildlife Area.

The group, Canadian Wildlife Service is a great group, but we have set a precedent. Can the Government now refuse others who may wish to fulfill a group goal, and close the area to everyone?

Could the current government controls be gradually eroded, and others take their place to the detriment of the Canadian public? Only time will tell, and the VOTE in the next election.



Lakers open in mid-February and are then a prime target. White Gables camp runs 9 or 10 huts and Bob and Cathy Brown will get you into fish real soon. Call them at (705) 237-8920 and they should be able to handle 35 anglers.

Amich Motor Motel has a good reputation as an ice fishing outfit and Gerry Haggstrom seems to know where the fish are located. 12 huts and handling 50 anglers is a lot of work, and the time on the ice pays off with knowledge. Phone (705) 569-3200 for reservations and consider the phone bill as an integral part of the trip cost.
