Now, because they damaged his crop, he seems to have changed his time.

At one of the meetings. a taxpayer suggested that the compost be stored elsewhere, rather than in a residential area, but we were told that was too expensive to even consider. Let it be noted that Mr. Skrow doesn't live in Georgetown so his home isn't affected.

I am a frequent user of mushrooms, but will never purchase Meadowglen products. In spite of being told we "were out to get him", we simply want Mr. Skrow to clean up his act, and intend to keep on trying. He must be the only one who finds the smell "worth it".




