## ABOUT THE HILLS

### St. Joseph's lights

The town's engineering department will be reporting back to council on a request to provide streetlighting outside the new St. Joseph's school in Acton. The school, located in the rural area on the fringes of Acton's urban boundary, would not normally be serviced with streetlights, but Acton Coun. Dave Whiting expressed concern that students often have to travel home in the dark if they stay for extracurricular activities.

### Seek grading

One request the town engineering department will have to consider when it prepares its annual budget comes from the residents of the Ninth and Tenth Lines as well as the Sideroad 27. They submitted a petition to the town's general committee through Coun. Russ Miller, asking that the routes be graded to bury the potholes.

### School computers

Trustees transferred \$300,000 to the reserve fund Thursday night, intending the money for micro-computer acquisitions in 1983. The Halton board of education wants to equip all secondary schools with computer laboratories and currently only has six labs. A five-year plan on the future development of computers and their uses in Halton is being completed by the board's computer advisory committee and will be brought before trustees in January.

### Ski trails await

There are ten kilometres of groomed ski trails waiting for skiers, snowshoers and hikers of all ages and experience levels at the Mountsberg Wildlife Centre operated near Campbellville by the Halton Region Conservation Authority. ## Arts centre display for your best snaps

The invitations are out for Halton Hills' second annual juried exhibition of photography, selected entries which will be displayed in the gallery of the Library-Cultural Centre next March.

Deadline for entries in "Photoart '83" is Feb. 12, at which time a jury of three local residents will assess each and choose prizewinners in separate black and white and color categories.

House Sol proprietor John Sommer and musician-photographer Bruce Harding return as judges for the second year, this time joined by former Herald photographer Peter Jones.

Participants can enter up to six photographs but not less than four, each measuring between 16 by 20 inches and five by seven inches. Prints must not be framed but mounted on white board with a three-inch margin around the photograph. Each must be signed in pencil by the photographer on the white board in the

lower right hand corner. Color and black and white prints of any subject are acceptable, but not polaroids.

For insurance purposes, the value of each photograph must be written on the back of the mounted photo along with the name, address and phone number of the entrant, plus any relevant

information about the print itself.

Bring your entries to the Library-Cultural Centre in a sealed envelope marked "Photoart '83" no later than Feb. 12.

Mr. Sommer hosted Photoart '82 early this year at his Charles Street gallery, attracting a wide variety of talented photographers.

A Georgetown man was sentenced Monday to two years less a day in prison after pleading guilty in Supreme Court to being an accessory to murder.

Bradley James Fendley, 21, of Georgetown, was originally charged with first-degree murder in connection with the March 24 shooting death of 30-year-old Donald Joseph Berriau at a farmhouse in Erin Township. But Assistant Crown Attorney Owen Haw said the case for murder was a weak one.

According to the Crown's information, Berriau was gunned down in his home at around 1 a.m. last March 24 by 22-year-old David McClean.

Later that day, police surrounded a Georgetown apartment building and arrested Fendley, but McClean shot himself before he was apprehended, Chief Justice Gregory Evans was told.

NOTE

The Crown said McClean left a suicide note in which he admitted murdering Berriau and said he preferred death to

the prospect of spending 25 years in jail.

The Crown's information indicated Fendley and McClean were driven to the Berriau farmhouse on the night in question by a third party.

Fendley knew McClean was armed and bore malice against Berriau, the court was told. McClean sent Fendley into the house to make sure Berriau was home because McClean had been barred from the Berriau residence in connection with a knifing incident the previous New Year's Eve.

The Crown said McClean then went into the house, got Berriau out of bed and, after some discussion, shot him in the neck with a sawed-off shotgun.

The Crown pointed out that Fendley assisted McClean in leaving the scene, failed to notify police of the shooting, and initially lied to police after he was arrested - all of which made him an accessory after the fact.

Haw called for a sentence of three to five years in a federal penitentiary to deter others

A three-year old child was struck in the chest by a pellet from a 22-calibre pistol Tuesday, at approximately 6:30 p.m. in Acton. The girl is in satisfactory condition at Toronto's Sick Children's Hospital where she was transferred from Georgetown Memorial Hospital. The father of the child was charged with criminal negligence causing bodily harm and will appear in Milton provincial court Jan. 10, Halton regional police said. He has been released from custody. The mother was home at the time of the shooting, police said.
