Gymnastics, judo returning to Y

The Georgetown YMCA will have a variety of programs returning for children and teens that vary from ballet to babysitters training. Why not become involved in a Y program for the winter season?

The Y's ballet program will continue Tuesdays and will include pre-Primary, primary, level 1, 2, 3, 4, junior and adult classes. Ballet classes begin Jan. 18 and will end May 10. Once again, Liz Chalmers will be the ballet instructor.

Y Gymnastics for boys and girls 6 to 14 years will continue Monday evenings at Centennial Middle School. The gymnastics program provides children with an opportunity to be involved in recreational gymnastics for those with little or no gymnastics experience.

Y swim lessons are held Sunday evenings, which includes Parent and Tot, Tiny Tots, Otter, Seal, Dolphin, Swimmer and Star I-VI. The Y believes in progressive evaluation with no final examination and your child will be credited with achievement on an ongoing basis by their own instructor. The

Y provides small classes with qualified, caring staff.

Youth Basketball (YBA) will begin Jan. 14 at St. Francis School for 8 to 10 year olds. The intermediate program for 11 to 15 year olds begins Jan. 13 at Joseph Gibbons School.

Babysitters training for 12 to 14 year olds will be held Saturday mornings at Mountainview Baptist Church. For Girls Only is a six-week self-improvement program for 11 to 15 year olds. For Girls Only includes hair care, make-up, skin care and the program is held on Tuesday evenings at the Y.

Kids Cooking for 6 to 9 year olds will be held Saturday mornings. Kids Cooking will be an eight-week program that will include nutritional recipes, and instruction in the basic skills of cooking, measuring, pouring and so on. French Fun is an after school program for seven to 10 year olds who wish to use conversational French through a variety of activities.

French Fun is more suited to children who are involved in French Immersion or have had some French at school.

Teen Aerobics will be held Tuesday and Thursday after school at St. George's Church.

P.D. Day Happenings for 5 to 13 year olds will be returning Jan. 31, March 14 as well as March Break Happenings from March 20 to 24. A variety of activities will be planned for school P.D. Days. Activities run from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and extended care is from 7:30 to 9 a.m. and 4:30 to 6 p.m. Watch for flyers from your child's school.

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Georgetown man gets two years as accessory

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from "assisting someone to defeat justice."

Chief Justice Evans told Fendley he was "a very fortunate person" in that the Crown saw fit not to proceed with the original charge of first-degree murder.

"There's no question that you knew Mr. McClean had a gun," Evans told Fendley. "You were not there for the purpose of just accompanying McClean."

He said the incident "turned out to be really an execution," and later added, "there's no question (Berriau) was dead when he hit the floor."

Evans said the fact that Fendley was a friend of McClean's did not excuse him from his duty as a citizen to inform police of

the shooting.

"Police have to depend on help from citizens," he observed, noting, "Only after McClean's suicide did you come forward. That type of friendship is going to cost you."

In sentencing Fendley, Evans said he intended to give the accused "an opportunity to reflect on your life and set a few guidelines for the future... I think in your case there is a good prospect for reformation and rehabilitation."

He said that impression, coupled with the fact that Fendley has spent the last nine months in custody at the Wellington Detention Centre, figured in the determination of a sentence of two years less a day.
