## Council won't use reserve for town hall restoration

A reserve fund originally meant to pay for the demolition of the old Acton town hall won't be used for the building's restoration. Almost three years ago, council agreed to put the demolition money in a reserve fund as Acton groups organized fund-raising campaigns like the Actario lottery to pay for restoration. Part of the original \$40,000 was used last year to hire a consultant to find out if the hall could be restored. Later, when council decided to tear the building down, the remaining money resumed its initial role.

Only councillors Tom Hill, John McDonald, Dave Whiting and Ross Knechtel favored using the money to help restore the building under the proposal accepted by council earlier Monday night. The rest agreed that if Acton citizens are to restore the building, they would have to do so without town money. "I'm quite confident that the people of Acton can restore the building or they wouldn't have made the proposal in the first place," Coun. Phil Carney said.

Town budget chairman Harry Levy argued that in an era of fiscal restraint, he is not prepared to see the money used for restoration.

Had council supported the proposal to use the funds for restoration, it would have first recovered the \$4,000 to \$5,000 it cost the town to hire consultants and lawyers

to argue its case before the provincial Conservation Review Board two weeks ago. The fund is now estimated at just over \$30,000. The board eventually determined that the hall's historical designation should remain, leading to town council's decision Monday to save the building from demolition. Coun. Pam Sheldon argued that if the town granted the money, almost \$100,000 in tax money would have been used in the restoration. Along with the \$30,000

remaining in the fund, she called the building's sale at \$1 a \$50,000 loss for taxpayers. During a 60-day period which ended in April, there were no bidders for the building at the town's asking price of \$50,000. Coun. Knechtel reminded councillors that contributing the \$30,000 to the building would be somewhat of an investment; under the arrangement endorsed by council, the town could buy back a fully-restored and therefore considerably more valuable building for \$1.

### Garage fire

A garage fire at 8:18 p.m. Friday on Maple Avenue caused an estimated \$6,000 damage. Ontario Hydro is going to be checking the garage this week in an effort to determine what caused the fire. There was no car in the garage, used for general storage, at the time.
