

# Atom Tier 2s blast Orangeville

## ...but Burlington Majors win

The Georgetown Liftech Atom Tier II team beat the Burlington majors on a victorious note with a 6-1 win over Orangeville on the week-end.

This ended a successful week in which the team beat the Burlington minor team 7-2, and lost a closely contested game with the Burlington major 3-2.

In the Orangeville game at Alcott arena, Liftech came out flying, scoring five unanswered goals in the first period, then coasting the rest of the way to the 6-1 win.

Scoring for Georgetown were Chad Bailey with two goals, Dave Bewley

with two goals, Steve Alchin and Jim English with singles. Assists went to Rob Boyle (2), Dale McNiven (2), Jim English (2), Steve Alchin, and Dean Robbins.

In the game against the Burlington majors, Georgetown was going against the only unbeaten team in the loop.

In fact, Georgetown is the only team to have scored on them. Georgetown started off very tentatively, and quickly fell behind 2-0 by the end of the first period.

But a good save by Georgetown goalie Ron Desrosiers early in the second period seemed to turn the tide, and a goal by Steve Alchin assisted

by Dave Watts midway through the second period started the comeback.

Georgetown continued to put lots of pressure on Burlington, and it paid off at the 5:27 mark of the third period when defenseman Jamie Tripp intercepted a Burlington clearing pass at their blue line, moved into the slot, and fired a wrist shot home to tie the score.

But back-to-back penalties with just over two minutes left were too much to weather, and on a rebound after a good save by goalie Rick Rivard, Burlington scored the game winner with 58 seconds left in the game.

Even though Georgetown were still a man short, they pulled the goalie, and with just seconds left Sean Gardner sent Chad Bailey in alone on goal, but Chad shot just wide.

Earlier in the week against the Burlington

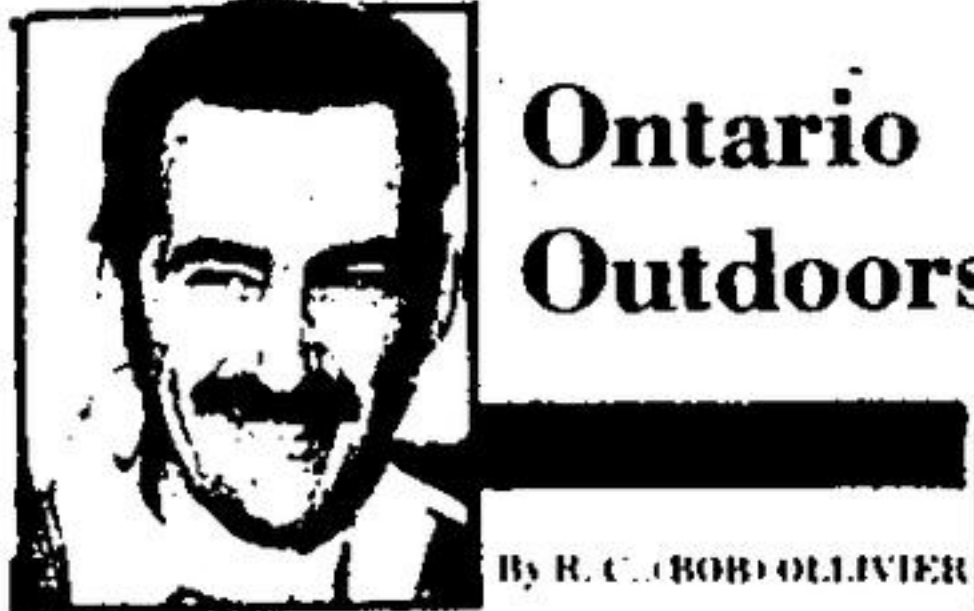
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### Ontario Outdoors

## Time for the outdoors

After talking to many people recently, I discovered that there will be lots of people with lots of time over the holidays. Some of them will take advantage of the hunting seasons that are still open.

A few (very few) will head up to the all-year fishing season areas, and get in some of the best fishing although the coldest of the year. The lakes and bays are still open, although the shore lines in some areas are fringed with ice.

Get your boat out from shore and troll very slow, and the chances are good you will get a few rainbow or even salmon. Pike, walleye, rainbow trout, brown trout and lake trout are all available to the avid fisherman.

Knowledge of the water is important however, and some experience with cold weather fishing. Dress warm and enjoy. Hunting of course provides some opportunities such as grouse, fox, rabbit and hares.

**SNOW TRACKING**

Now we have snow on the ground tracking is excellent, and even grouse can be tracked as they often feed on low lying berries and walk looking for (graze). Now with no leaves on the trees, the target is in view a little longer, although not much.

Use number seven shot in the breech and number four in the magazine for the longer second shot. There is something very enervating in cold weather grouse hunting, besides the cold fresh air... I have been feeding the birds at my feeders for some weeks now, and now they are really flocking in with the snow cover adding to the difficulties of getting enough to eat.

Now is the time to set up a suet block for the nuthatches and other birds that need that in their diet.

**OUTDOOR GIFTS**

For those who have not finished their Christmas shopping, think along the lines of outdoor oriented gifts. In this way you will encourage the recipient to enjoy the bounties provided by the one whose birthday we celebrate.

The cold weather of late has provided a base of ice on which more ice can form. Not all waterways are frozen of course, but they will in due time. Owen Sound is a very special place in the minds of many fishermen in Ontario.

The rainbow trout runs have been coming in here before the salmon hit the scene. Those who knew of those runs kept it a secret in order to keep the crowds out. Once the word did get out, those crowds turned up in heroic proportions. Often fishing three deep from the shore, those with the longest rod got the fish.

**RAINBOW RUN**

The fall run of rainbow made a two season fishery, and when the fish were found to hold in the bay and river mouths, it added what can be considered a third fishery, winter. With the smallness of water, the closeness to shore, a hut is not always needed.

Some like a hut to shut out light so they can see the fish under the ice, and some to keep warm. A hut is not as essential as on Lake Simcoe. You can walk to the fishing grounds in five minutes, in fact there is almost no transportation in the area for ice fishermen.

Build a wind shelter or dress warm, and cut your own hole. An auger is a small investment when it comes to the cost of an outfit. Two trips and it is paid for. Fish in 5 to 50 feet of water with the preference 25 feet.

Spoons get the nod with lures such as little Cleo's half wave blue and silver, or some such lure. Minnows are almost a foregone conclusion as trout and splake hit them with gusto, and a combo of lure and minnow is tops. Have fun and a great and blessed Christmas.
