

Bantam tournament preparations underway

Chairman hopes to increase teams

Preparations for Georgetown's 23rd Annual Bantam Hockey Tournament are well underway, according to chairman Al Martin, with the intentions of having a full contingent of 44 teams.

"We may end up with 40 teams, but we are going for 44," Martin sald. Last year the size of the tournament was reduced from 42 teams to 34 teams,

There is a chance the Junior B hockey playoffs might conflict with the tournament date, but Martin said he wouldn't know for sure until Febru-

ary."
"I'd hate to have to move four games into Memorial Arena (from Gordon Alcott Arena)," he sald. "We have to provide ice time if the Junior B's are still play-

JAMES HELPING Helping out with Martin is co-chairman Bill James who takes over from Howard Murphy. Members of the newly formed Georgetown at 1-1 in the second period & Minor Hockey Association have indicated their willingness to help with the tournament, Martin

The chairman has sent out 80 applications to prospective hockey centres for the tournament, held during the March school break. There are 16 paid entries received which means 26 teams

are still required. Because the tournament last year lost some money, the cost of the 1963 registration has gone up \$10 per team. Martin doesn't believe the slump in the economy is keeping people away from tournaments. "The people I talked to, they are only worried about playing and not the costs." However, he thought costs could be a factor in

registrations this year. Thus far teams such as Windsor, Leamington, Copper Cliff (Levak) have committed themselves with an inquiry from Petrolla which used to compete in the Bantam tournament a few years

with the tournament application forms a survey asking teams what type of format they would prefer for 1984.

The reason is that the tournament committee would like to explore the possibilities of a round robin type tournament instead of a sudden death elimination type. The problem with a

round robin is that the teams would stay around longer for their games and thus more billetting would be required, Martin said.

Now, a team that does not win doesn't play any more games - only if a team wins do they keep playing. In recent years there

has been a problem in luring teams from the United States because our March school break no longer corresponds with theirs.

Lt.-Gov. John Aird

might be back for the Saturday morning to present trophies to the top teams, Martin said, but he hasn't yet sent a letter asking him. A number of guest celebrities might be on hand for the 1983

trophy presentations, Martin said. CLIPBOARD LADY

Billetting supervisor ("the lady with the clipboard", Martin jokes) Karen Harrison will look after accommodations while timekeepers are under the supervision of Ron Knight and Brian James. The Georgetown referces association under Gerry Perkins handle the referee assignments.

A committee is currently looking into three possibilities for serving food for the 14-year old hockey players, Martin said. He said the tournament will probably offer one meal per day.

Figure-skater Darren Kemp became the third resident from Georgetown to advance to the Canadian figure-skuting champlonships following in the footsteps of Kris Barber and Dave Watson.

The 16-year-old came fourth in his figures in the Men's Novice Division, then went on to an overall third place finish based on the performance of his free skate routine.
