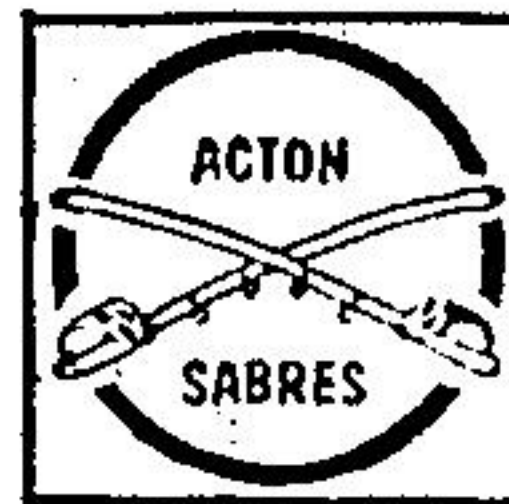
Acton then put Rob Ruffino in net to replace Chris Martin as Streetsville ended the period leading 5-2.
