LEGION HISTORY

In October of 1954, disaster hit southern Ontario with Hurricane Hazel, and once again Branch 120 stepped into the breach locally, organizing immediate aid and collecting comforts and clothing needed for the victims.

for supplies as they were gathered. Members used cars and trucks to make the necessary collections and to deliver them.

A new padre was welcomed as the spiritual guide for the group, the Rev. Kenneth Richardson, and he entered into his new duties with enthusiasm. Already a Legion

member (an air force vet) he soon became a familiar figure to all members of Branch 120.

With the increase in membership space was at a premium in the auditorium and it was decided to give access to the fairly large room at the rear by cutting a 12-foot arch through. This was accomplished, and a larger and more comfortable ladies powder room was installed. It is interesting to note that the Legion began to receive many requests for donation of flags, and in the immediate future a school building program in town made the demand for flags very heavy.
