Stepping down

The Acton Junior B Sabres have asked Glenn Murray, a former player for the team, to take over the coaching spot for the rest of the season.

Former coach Bill Richmond relinquishes his post for the next four games of the regular season. Murray, now skating with the Georgetown Chrysler Raiders, says he has seen the Sabres play about six times this season.

Swordsmen were defeated 4-2 against Milton but the Steamers were outshot by Acton 46-26. Murray felt the youth of the club this season has been a contributing factor to how the team has

In his first game behind the bench the Acton

done in 1982-83. He says there are only three players over the age of 19 years. The younger players still have a lot to learn about junior hockey, the new Acton coach says. In the next two weeks Murray says he would like to see

the team play more aggressive hockey and see an improvement in their desire. "If they play as a team they can make it competitive in the playoffs," he says.

The playoff structure is such that Acton will play one of the top four teams in the Central League. The first round is a best of seven.

Nicknamed 'Motor', Murray says he used to coach minor hockey, but this is his first try at the Junior B level.

Former coach Bill Richmond said if he were to start the 1982-83 season again he would probably try and teach more basics and not adapt a sophisticated system right away.

His Oakville juvenile team Richmond coached had triple A experience and thus they were more adept to know more at an early age, he sald.

Richmond said the Acton Sabres did eventually respond and they did improve by the end of the season. The decision to make a coaching change was in an effort to "shake things up", the former Acton coach sald.

It became evident by early January, that with four returning players, two of them juveniles, the team wouldn't be competitive, Richmond said.

The team had the option of using money to buy some quality imports or take their lumps with local boys, he said. A Jan. 7 meeting gave him a unanimous vote

of confidence from the executive, Richmond said. Later, a member of the executive decided the team should base their philosophy around winning more games, he said. The team has 24 eligible local players for next

year's Acton Sabres, so for the 1983-84 season the next coach will have a sound criteria to work with. Richmond will stay on as general manager, a post that he has assumed for most of the 1982-83

season because of the ailments of regular GM Brian Richmond said he won't be back next year in

Junior B hockey because he's had better offers for a higher calibre of hockey.
