information, call 877-3700. First produced by Toronto's Phoenix Theatre in October, 1960, the contemporary Canadian play exposes the soap opera side of Canadlar, living, as playwright Stratton's characters on "types" try to live out their fantasies.

WIFE DOMINATED

"Nurse Jane" is the story of a wimpish, wifedominated teacher (Wilf Brookes) who makes a failing attempt to have an affair with a fellow student in his ceramics

Believing his broadcaster-columnist wife will be away for the weekend, Edgar Chisholm brings home classmate Vivien Bliss (Fern Slawson) to share his bed.

The writer of a series of Harlequin romances on Nurse Jane, a fictious character leading the ideal love life, Vivien calls herself a "novelist of passion and intrigue" and she's sorely disappointed that her personal life lacks these two elements.

Writing about the starry-eyed Nurse Jane's successful romances in exotic locales, rouses the envy of the frustrated Vivien who continuously must face the fallures she experiences in real life.

"Nurse Jane is a virgin, but she gets more than a parting embrace," Vivien scolds Edgar when he begins to regret what he's about to do.

Spewing the classic male lines women have learned to expect from less-than-honorable males. Edgar tells his lover-to-be '"I'll never forget you"; "I don't want to hurt you"; "I'll still call you after the weekend".

FANTASY Living in her fantasy world, Vivien willingly swallows Edgar's show of interest in her person.

"Edgar's very interested in my work; he's given me lines," she asserts to Doris Chisholm (Connie Halverson) when they're having a "discoveredlover"-to-wife talk. "I'm sure he has," Doris replies sarcastically.


