Lighting, carpeting needs

Appeal by library for security system

Town councillors next week will consider whether or not to add funds to the 1983 library budget, following an urgent appeal by library board chairman Doug Magwood.

Mr. Magwood asked council last Monday night to restore to the budget three library projects totalling \$18,071.

One project, worth \$9,200, would install a special security system at the Georgetown library branch to cut down on book theft, Mr. Magwood said that lighting in the downstairs part of the branch is also defficient and he wants to spend \$3,628 to correct the prob-

The board has also proposed spending \$5,243 to replace the carpet in the Acton library. The carpet has been there since the building was constructed 15 years ago.

of putting it - it's theft," Mr. Magwood said. "Thousands of dollars worth of holdings disappear each year. The security system would reduce the loss of our holdings."

Meanwhile, a design flaw in the lower section of the Georgetown branch, means that lighting falls well below the standards set for an area of its size, Mr. Magwood noted.

Using a standard of 30 foot candles as a measure, the board had the library checked and found that there is barely half that amount of lighting in some parts of the lower area. In one section the lighting was down to three foot-candles.

"The lighting was designed to bounce off the ceilings and onto the sheives," Mr. Magwood explained, "In spite of the good intentions of the designer, it just doesn't work."

(Georgelown's old library was expanded and joined with the new cultural centre two years ago).

"I won't say we've been neglecting the library in Acton, but we have been focusing a lot of attention on the new facility in Georgetown," Mr. Magwood said.

Councillors Pam Sheldon and Phil Carney suggested that council add the two Georgetown library projects, but opted to keep the carpeting for the Acton branch out of the budget, at least for this year. It was noted that the security system and the lighting project were rejected from last year's library budget.

Mr. Magwood said the library budget has been pared down from what was originally conceived

last fall. It is now 8.3 per cent over last year's budget. (Outside of miscellaenous grants, the library received \$475,649 from the town last year).

If the security system and lighting project were included, this year's library budget would be 11 per cent more than in

Coun. Harry Levy advised councillors not to make a decision on the library projects until it has reviewed the town's entire budget next Monday.

Otherwise, it would put the budget committee, "which has pared until It hurts" on the spot, Coun, Levy said.

Acton students volunteer for stream bed clean-up

An Acton environmental science class wants to clean up and revitalize a local stream which flows into Fairy Lake.

While the project is not funded by the town, it was heartily endorsed by councillors following a presentation by Naomi Donat, Kathy Johns and Joanne McArthur -- students in the Grade 12 CIRRS.

The class' immediate concern, Miss Johns explained, is the section of the stream which flows by the library and into Fairy Lake west of Highway 7.

Halton Hills Library board chairman Doug

Magwood, also at the council meeting for a

different matter, acknowledged that garbage and weeds have been a problem with the stream which is shallower and slower in the Acton Library area.

By narrowing the stream channel closest to Falry Lake, Miss Johns said, the stream's flow velocity will increase. Rocks will also boost the oxygen supply "and provide a variety of homes for invertebrates (on) which fish can feed."

"The rocks will also create a safe bed from which the minnows will hatch and feed," the class writes in its presentation to council.

Narrowing the stream bed slightly will help prevent it from drying up in the library area, the girls noted. The province's ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) have said that water in the stream water can support life and have, in fact, found such fish species as large and small mouth bass, sunfish and chubb.

As part of the courses' curriculum, Miss Johns sald, the students have to spend a great deal of time outdoors working on various projects.

"By living outdoors," the class presentation notes, "we gain a wide appreciation for the environment and learn to

understand the mechanics of nature."

The most intensive phase of the project is to last three years, Miss Johns sald, and then 10 years of constant maintenance by the class to ensure that the stream becomes an active aquatic environment.

She told the committee that the class is being advised by MNR on the project and the work is supervised by class teacher Jane Zarowny.

Stream work will be carried out by student volunteers and they are looking for supplies of rocks. Councillor Tom Hill suggested the class seek a donation of stone from a local quarry.
