Due to this problem, the marketing club of Georgetown District High School have decided to undertake a shoplifting prevention campaign. Chapter members plan to undertake a number of activities to achieve the following goals:

- 1) To bring to the public an awareness of the amount of money lost yearly through shoplifting.
- 2) To encourage local retailers to ban together and fight this problem.
- 3) To discourage those who may think of shoplifting in the future.
- 4) To encourage citizens to report any acts of shoplifting they encounter.

The committee members heading the campaign are: Kevin Powers, Jeff Wilson, Pat Turner, Mrs. Barbara Haisall; parent volunteer and Mr. Genore; class advisor.

Plans are being made to conduct surveys and presentations in several local schools. Two of these schools have agreed to participate in a poster contest.

Several highschool students will be asked to prepare essays in favor of our campaign. Posters and pamphlets containing further information will be distributed to Georgetown retailers. Various slogans will be seen on bulletins in the Georgetown area.

The shoplifting prevention campaign committee is hoping for your co-operation for a successful campaign.

Flood grants

Ontario grants totaling \$67,255 will be used by the Haltion Region Conservation Authority to assist with the establishment of an improved flood warning and streamflow forecasting system.

Natural Resources Minister Alan W. Pope in approving the five year project, said the establishment of an up-to-date flood warning and streamflow forecasting system will greatly assist the Authority in water management responsibilities.

The system will assist the Authority in the operation and maintenance of its four multi-purpose reservoirs, two

diversion channels and four flood control channels, as well as its co-ordination role during flood emergencies.
