

# GLT's Neville sets hairtrigger on 'Deathtrap'

So sensitive is the plot to Georgetown Little Theatre's (GLT) final

offering of the season, Ira Levine's "Deathtrap" that the actors have just about been sworn to secrecy.

"I have decreed," director Neville Worsnop told The Herald last week during a break in rehearsal, "that nobody tells anybody the plot of the play."

What he would say, however, is that theatre-goers are in for one of the most electrifying dramas to join GLT's long list of accomplishments, along the same high-tension wire as "Dracula" and Mr. Levine's "Veronica's Room". (Both GLT productions were directed by Mr. Worsnop.)

**THRILLER**  
In two acts and six scenes, the play will roller-coaster viewers through "all sorts of thrills, shocks and red herrings," Mr. Worsnop said.

"The first time I saw it I almost jumped out of my seat—in fact, I would have if the person next to me hadn't jumped into my lap first," he joked.

Mr. Worsnop has a policy about the plays he produces: "I won't see the film or play if I'm going to direct it myself within the year."

"Because when I prepare the play I like to give it my stamp, not somebody else's."

That "stamp" is very subtle, however; Mr. Worsnop doesn't do productions so that the audience recognizes tell-tale elements characterizing his work.

"I think that the nicest compliment an audience can pay a director is to see the play and ask 'What does the director do?'" Mr. Worsnop said. "If they can't pinpoint what he has done then it's successful. One doesn't want to be obtrusive or you start taking away what is to be presented on stage."

**OPENESS**  
While he enters rehearsals with a scheme for the production, Mr. Worsnop welcomes constructive criticism from the actors and producers.

"For instance, we've barely got through half the play tonight," Mr. Worsnop pointed out, "and we've already had about ten different suggestions which will help build on it."

People join GLT and perform in its plays for fun, he stressed and the lines of communication between the play's administrators and thespians have to remain open.

"It takes a lot of people to put a play together and make it work," Mr. Worsnop said.

Deathtrap is being produced by GLT veteran

Dorothy Hunt with associate producer Edie Behie.

One new GLT member will make his theatrical debut in the production:

David Clifton will play Porter Milgrim.

Other names are more familiar with GLT followers: Derek Joyne will play Sidney Bruhl; Jill

Evans has been cast as Myra Bruhl; Rod Cook, fresh from his recent role as Peter Prior in "Nurse Jane goes to Hawaii"; and Mary Goebel will play Helga Ten Drop.

The performance are set for April 22, 23, 27, 28, 29 and 30 at the John Elliott Theatre, beginning at 8 p.m. Book early for seats by calling the GLT box office at 877-3600.

## University of Waterloo offers two courses

### Plan a studios spring

The University of Waterloo will offer two courses in Halton Hills this spring, starting in April and continuing through to the end of June. A social work course will be given in the Georgetown District High School Tuesday evenings, starting April 5, and a

sociology course will be given in the Acton Public Library Thursday evenings, starting April 7.

The social work course will be presented in conjunction with the Halton Hills Recreation and Parks Department. It will be on "Community Organization" and will deal

with change in communities, using formal and informal networks and self-help systems.

Community organization is seen as an effective way of bringing about change in communities in the interests of more equal treatment of citizens, or providing them with more control over their lives, or with more opportunity, through participation.

Course instructor will be Neal Ruten.

The sociology course, entitled "Sociology of Education", will deal with current trends and issues in education including: teacher militancy, school organization, the youth culture and its effect on education, student attitudes, the role of the teacher, education and employment.

The instructor for this course will be Henry John Regehr who recently completed his PhD in sociology at Waterloo.

He has had many years of teaching experience at the university level including courses in introductory sociology, social problems, criminology, social development of Canada, sociological theory and social research methods.

**CREDIT**  
The courses may be taken for credit towards a university degree, or may simply be attended as a free lecture series. Senior citizens (60 and over) may take courses for credit towards a degree on a cost-free basis. Students may register at any of the first three class meetings.

## Dolls and watercolors featured in new Gallery House Sol show

Gallery House Sol is featuring the works of two artists at 45 Charles St., Georgetown from April 2 to April 21. The following is some background information on the artists and their work by Gallery House Sol proprietor John Sommer.

**CAROLE BLACK'S** dolls are a delightful first for Gallery House Sol. We never had an exhibition of dolls, but her's are so charming and so artfully done, that we took the opportunity to exhibit the work of this local doll-maker with great eagerness.

Carole Black's dolls are not thought to be for children. They are minute replicas of ladies of the 18th and 19th century.

Six years ago Carole Black became interested in the history of fashion, and this, in turn, was to start her doll making. Soon her friends became interested in what she was doing and she found herself asked to talk about her dolls and to display them.

About two years ago

she created a whole street scene for the shop window of Manning Antiques in Streetsville with 15 dolls - men, women and children - in the fashions of 1890.

This window display earned her an honorable mention, and encouraged her to perfect her craft to its present level, which is very high indeed.

**E.J. REVELL'S** delicate botanical watercolors are another reason not to miss this Easter exhibition at House Sol. He is one of the foremost botanical artists in the country, and he has exhibited at House Sol since 1973.

In these 10 years he has exhibited with us here in

Georgetown eight times! We are the only commercial gallery that sells his paintings. He is the illustrator of one of the finest books published by the Toronto University Press, the 1980 publication "and some brought flowers".

From April 9 to May 3, 1983 there will be an exhibition at the Royal Ontario Museum in Toronto called "Cloudflowers". The exhibition will feature the works of ten Canadian botanical artists, E.J. Revell is one of them.

During most of 1982, Mr. Revell was in England on a sabbatical. The 38 watercolor paintings in this show at Gallery

House Sol from April 2 to April 21, 1983, he brought back with him when he returned to Toronto.

Both artists will be at the gallery on April 2 from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. Admission is free.
