

Mill Street work \$312,000

Capital budget approved

Road reconstruction, improvements to the town's Acton and Georgetown Business Improvement Areas and a proposed new soccer facility near the Gordon Alcott arena are among lietus listed in the town's \$3.5 million capital budget this year.

The town's recreation and parks department has set aside \$55,000 for the soccer field which would be adjacent to the Alcott tennis courts. Cost for the facility would at least by partially shared by the town's soccer organization.

It is envisioned, rec department director Tom Shepard told The Herald Tuesday, "as a first class facility" which would more likely be used by upper level soccer clubs.

A schematic plan shows the fleid surrounded by a fence and trees, Soccer benches and bleschers for fans would be built along with change rooms.

With financial assistance from the schools, the recreation department will also install playground equipment at Howard Wrigglesworth and St. Francis of Assist schools in Georgetown, as well as at St. Joseph's school in Acton.

There will be roof repairs and plexigless replacement at the Gordon Alcott arena and roof repairs at Georgetown's Memorial Arena.

Other capital projects planned this year are: -reconstruction of Mill Street and Park Avenue at a total cost of \$312,000 -a \$53,000 second phase of

reconstruction along Fourth Line and Sideroad

-\$172,900 will be spent in the Georgetown and Acton downtown cores. The Mill Street landscape will be improved in Georgetown along with the road reconstruction and work is planned on Acton's Mill Street as well as parking and sidewalk projects in the commu-

-the town's engineering department plans to spend \$303,600 to replace old ecuipment and add new pieces never before In the inventory, including a cemetery monument mounter worth

\$1,500 -working with the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, the town has atream and river work projects at the Glen Williams cametery. Eden Place in Silvercreek, Norval, the Paper Mill Dam on River Drive and other water shed channel improvements elsewhere in the community.

These will cost \$62,200 of which \$41,450 is paid by town taxpayers and \$50,710 from a provincial


