His activities on Parliament Hill have been varied. Senator Murray co-chaired the Special Joint Senate-Commons Committee on Official Languages from 1980 to 1982, acted as Parliamentary Observer for the special session of the United Nations General Assembly in September

## Girls Pipeband receive grant

As councillors Monday night approved a \$1,500 grant to the Georgetown Girls Pipeband, they

seemed to be agreeing with Coun. Mike Armstrong. "The band carries on work which is vital to the community," Coun. Arm-

strong said. "It's probably the cheapest form of publicity the town can get and I think we should honor that request and help them keep up the good work which has gone in the past."

Pipeband rep Valerie Cunningham said the band will have about 10 new members join this year. Excluding shoes and instruments, she explained, it costs about \$1,100 to \$1,200 to outfit each band member.

**ALLOCATIONS**  
Council agreed to add \$700 to the pipeband's grant this year, drawing from the \$803 left over from \$9,000 in grant allo-

cations in this year's budget. The band has historically received money from the town with periodic fluctuations up to \$1,500 when higher than normal expenses are forecast.

Ms. Cunningham said the band, which was formed in 1942, has performed throughout Ontario and Quebec and occasionally played in the U.S. Its performances are always well received, she noted, at Highland games in Fergus, Brantford and Georgetown (Speyside games).

The band charges the town when it performs at local public affairs.

## The fastest growing fair

"The Acton fall fair is probably the fastest growing fair in Ontario," fair president Keith Aitken said. "We now pay out in excess of \$30,000 in prize money and we have the largest agricultural show in the area."

Already in the throes of organizing this year's fair, the 125 members of the Acton Agricultural Society are meeting regularly. Founded in 1913, the fair board is celebrating their 70th anniversary this year. The anniversary will be a theme in this year's fair plans.

New members are always welcome, with a junior members committee also in existence for the younger fair fans, Mr. Aitken said.

This is Mr. Aitken's second term as president. Back in 1918, his grandfather, J.E. Pearson was the second person to be president of the Acton fair; and, in 1963 (during the fair's 50th anniversary) and 1984, his father C.J. Aitken was president.
