April big for anglers

April is here, the big month for fishermen. It heralds the first of the open seasons, and the one that draws the most attention.

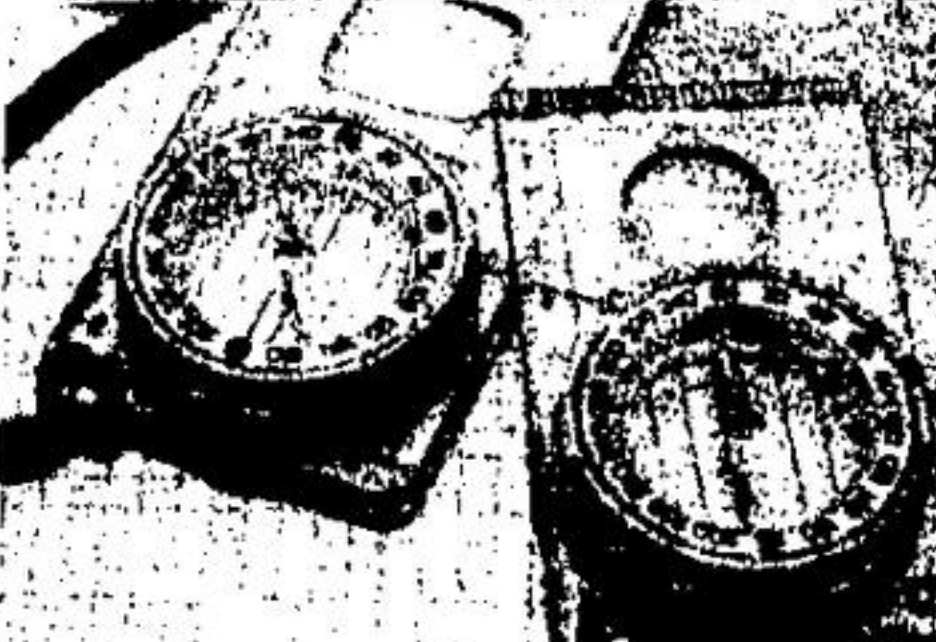
Fishing in some areas is open all year, so the excitement of opening day is just not there.

If you plan to participate in opening day why not start your plans now. If you intend to fish private property, ask permission now as there may be new owners since last year. New laws demand you have written permission to travel or hunt and fish on private land, and you had better have it with you.

The dam area of the stream at Stowartown is now under new ownership, as the person that owned it at this time last year has moved out. Actually, they never moved in, but the new owner may not open it up to the public.

The dam at Norval is still private, and it seems that most of the fishing areas in the province have been snapped up over the years, so you and I have to work for the right to fish and hunt in good areas. New laws may change that, but these laws are still in the investigation stage.

Trout Unlimited is an organization that is working to open some areas to the fisherman and has made some progress. A "special regulations" section has been opened on the Credit River at the forks due to the efforts of Trout Unlimited. The club has scheduled another cleanup and bank protection day for April 23. If you are not a member of Trout Unlimited you can write them at 2180 Yonge Street, Toronto, M4S 2Z9. Membership is only \$19 per year and the superb magazine TROUT will be included.

Good Friday saw the newly-formed Georgetown Track Club enter its inaugural race.

The fourth annual Billy Taylor Memorial 15-kilometer race around the University of Guelph was the scene on a bright, sunny day.

Eighteen club members, many in their first race ever, competed against an elitist field of more than 400 runners. Toronto's John Craig won the event in a blistering time of 45 minutes and 51 seconds, about two minutes off a world record pace. Dave Edge, the premier marathoner in the country, ran second, just six seconds behind Craig.

Georgetown's best result on the day came from Scott Harris, who covered the distance in 54 minutes and 35 seconds for 66th place overall. Bob Parker was the next local runner to cross the finish line. His time of 57:14 was good enough for 104th overall, 10th in his division.

Lynn MacPhail came fourth in her class at 61:53, followed by Tony Mathews, Paul Burroughs Sr., Jimmy Clark and Don Mashinter.

Sandra Marciniuk, Joe Cleary, David Lindfors, Brian Markham, Dave Steen, Ken Halsall, Brian and Karen Cosgrove, Paul Hyde, Donna Metcalfe and Hans Lindfors all ran the route for the local club.

Meanwhile, the club is continuing to meet for Sunday morning fun runs. Walkers are welcome, and newcomers are invited for the activity and coffee and donuts following the exercise.
