### Stock up on bug stopper

With April rushing by, trout season will soon be upon us. This brings on thoughts of walking along stream banks, and insects.

It is not too soon to get stocked up on insect repellent. I am going to get my supply soon, and you can be sure it will be "Breck's Ole' Time Woodman Fly Dope". This is one of the most effective insect repellents you can buy.

There is one brand that seems to draw the most praise, yet I have found it to be destructive to plastic, and the fisherman in particular handles a lot of plastic in a day. "Breck's Ole' Time" is made with the full benefit of the well known repellent "Deet", and is not so destructive.

Hot spots for opening day. The CREDIT RIVER, as I have been predicting for the last few years, should be HOT this year. If you want big rainbow trout, then try the Credit. Fish below NORVAL but be sure you are not on private property, and do not leave a mess on the bank.

Any fisherman that must start at midnight, and have a fire going on shore will not catch fish. You must move around to find the best location, and feeding trout. This is a watch notice and I want ALL my readers to take note. IF YOU FIND ANYONE fishing before season opens on April 30th, they MUST be reported to the Ministry of Natural Resources (dial Zenith 7-3000, to reach the Maple office.) The office in charge of Halton and west of here is Cambridge and they can be contacted at (519) 658-9356. Go through the operator and ask for the call to be collect.

When the season opens, try small zero or number one size MEPPS spinners, small worms for the bait fisherman, or NYMPHS for the fly fisherman. The all round favorite nymph is the "Hares Ear", preferably the Gold Rib style. These seem to represent all manner of forage food for trout in streams and ponds alike.

Breck's make a line of fly they call HYFLY. They are an excellent fly and at a reasonable price. If your local sporting goods store does not carry them, ask them if they can order them for you. I will be showing some HYFLY sets at my open house at GEORGETOWN CANADIAN TIRE STORE on April 23.

This is excellent time to find out how to fish trout and other species of fish. More details in next week's column, but suffice to say, there will be a wide range of demonstrations on all aspects of fishing. If you are a novice or an expert, drop by to say hello, or ask about the coming season and what is new. The time will be 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., so reserve a time to drop by. Fill in a free draw ticket and maybe win some tackle for the year's fishing.

Regular readers of ONTARIO OUTDOORS will remember that I have featured the books by Ontario Outdoor Publications. The Hines-Herringer-Jensen series include Ontario Fishing Guide, Trout-Salmon Guide and now the Northern Ontario Fishing Guide and the Tackle Box Guide. I have the first three and will feature them on April 23. I hope to get the tackle box guide soon, so I should have that there also. If you can find them, buy them, and if not, I have order forms. Call me at any reasonable time and I will make sure you get one. They are excellent, and should be in your library.

# Swimmers training for Regionals

A pair of Georgetown athletes are preparing for an encore performance at the East Regional Games for the Physically Disabled, later this spring in Mississauga.

Neil Mercer and Johnny Payton, a pair of local 15-year-olds who happen to be best buddies, are currently training for the provincial competi-

tion for handicapped athletes.

Johnny, who suffers from a spinal condition and is permanently confined to a wheelchair, competes in the pool, and on the track. He was first

in the 50-meter freestyle swim race and second in the breast stroke over the same distance at last

year's games, and this year he plans to compete in the 60, 100 and 1500 meter wheelchair races.

A little heavier set in the upper body, Neil was first in the 50-meter back stroke last year, and he is

planning on entering the discuss, shotput, air pistol and table tennis events at this year's games. Neil

suffers from muscular dystrophy.

Neil, who attends E.C. Drury High School in Milton, said during a recent interview he and Johnny began competing in athletics "for something to do."

"We just started competing last year," Neil said. "We wanted to get ourselves a little more

active."

"Now we wheel around all summer," Johnny quipped. "We have to keep in shape, now."

Both boys were contacted about the possibility of entering the games last year by the Ontario Crippled Children's Society. They have never regretted getting involved, especially enjoying the social activity surrounding the competitions.

"The only thing I don't like about the competitions is the bruises," Johnny joked. "They give you a chance to get out and meet some people, and to get a look at some different types of racing chairs."

"I like meeting the girls," Neil grinned. Saturday, the boys will

hone their athletic talents at a pentathlon competition at Variety Village in Scarborough.

The boys will compete in wheelchair racing, shotput, discuss, weights, and club throw.

## Reb a York winner

Georgetown's Rebel High School track and field team participated in the York University Invitational meet held indoors at York Friday and Saturday.

A solid performance was turned in by junior Lynn Macphail, who won the senior girls 3000 metre race in 11 minutes and four seconds.

Amy Powers, a first-year midget, won her section of the junior girls 3000 metre and was fourth overall.

Sandy Heaton competed in the midget girls 400 metre. In the midget boys 400 metre Jim Manning of Stewarttown was third overall, at 56.0 seconds. Of the nine sections of junior boys 400 metre runners, Gary Hulbert finished second in his section.

In the midget girls 60 metre sprint, Sandy Rahn won her heat in 8.54 seconds, advancing to the semi-finals. Scott Pundack was fifth in his heat in the midget boys division.

In the senior boys division, containing nine heats, Paul Burroughs was fourth and Mike Lord was fifth.

Midget Mike Wood timed 10:11 for the junior boys 3000 metre event. Jeff Amato, a Grade 8 student came through in 10:22 and David Banks timed 10:29.

Fiona Heaton ran well in the junior girls 3000 metre event.

Amy Powers finished ninth overall of more than 30 runners in the midget girls 1500 metre race. In the midget boys 1500 metres, Mike Wood clock-

ed 4:40 and Gary Last went through at 5:04. Erik Hopkins was fourteenth out of 53 runners in the junior division timing 4:22.

Tanya Sherrard and Shawn Langdon ran in the junior girls 1500 metres.

The junior girls 400 metres featured Lee Blendell, timing 65.9 seconds, Karen Pepper in 67.6, Angie Mackey in 68.3 and Connie Powers clocking 73.7 seconds.

Michelle Barnard timed 2:47 in the midget girls 800 metres. Mike Wood finished in 2:22 in the midget boys division and in the senior girls division, Cym Newcombe timed 2:37.

In the open girls relay (up to the age of 19) Grade 8 runners Traci MacFarlane, Jenni Gallagher, Sandy Rahn and Alison Irvine ran.

The "B" team was made up of Cym Newcombe, Kim Somerville, Susan MacLaren and Nancy Mustard.

Georgetown's "A" team was fourth overall clocking 4:33 for the event.

The runners featured Sandy Heaton, Jody Barwell, Lee Blendell and Lynn Macphail.

In the boys division, the "B" team included runners Jim Manning, Scott Pundack, Rick MacGregor and Erik Hopkins. The "A" team consisted of Gary Hulbert, Mike Lord, Paul Burroughs and Ken Hesse.
