Kids win

Bob Donker of the Georgetown Track Club won the atom boys mile race in a time of 5 minutes and 41 seconds to highlight an extremely strong showing by local runners at the North York Track and Field Club's 18th annual Road Races last week.

Georgelown's Eddle Powers was second across the finish, with a time of 5:44, as the GTC atom boys clinched a divisional title.

Michael Melville of the GTC was seventh behind Donker, at six minutes flat, and teammate Tim Racinksy crossed the finish line two seconds later for ninth place. They were followed by Tim Parker and Boby Bouskill of the GTC.

The GTC atom girls were also the best at the meet, as Tara Bouskill covered the mile in 6:16 for second place overall.

She was followed by teammates Trina Wasylenko (ninth), Nancy Cocks (10th), Sheri Cave,

Sheri Nairn, Anna Toone and Kara Lynn Palmer.

The local track club took another first in the bantam boys mile race, with Jim Manning completing the distance in 5:26 to take fourth spot.

Jeff Amato was right behind Manning in fifth with a time of 5:27, and Jim Clark was 11th at 5:36.

Scott Lunn, Chris Bewley, Michael Huffman, Jason Dodokin, Jason Toone, Steven Eastwood, and Mark Shepherd all competed as bantams for the GTC.

The GTC bantam girls were second overall, behind the Oshawa Legion.
