



Town trims COED projects in Georgetown. The reno-

trimmed its 1983 budget recently, part of its proposed contribution to Canada-Ontario Employment Development (COED) projects was dropped.

Renovations . at Remembrance Park in Georgelown, an entrance at the Hornby Park community centre and some clerical work were shelved. Under the program, municipalities pay about 20 per cent of the gross costs of projects accepted by a committee administering the program.

Meanwhile, the town is sending a letter to the COED administrators this week to clear up some remaining points about the proposal to renovate, with COED and town money, & Church St.



The students of G.D.H.S. exhibit pride in their school, and respect for others. These values reflect the values of the community.


