Huntington's Disease crosses all boundaries

The fear of losing one's mind and the fear of losing control over one's body are among the most profound fears of mankind. Both losses occur in Huntington's Disease, a bereditary and terminal brain disorder that begins insidiously, usually in middle age.

Huntington's Disease crosses all age, sex, ethiic, national and economic boundaries. It is a family disease and every member of the family is affected emotionally. financially and socially.

The disease was once thought to be rare, but is now recognized as one of the more common hereditary disorders.

There is no reliable means of detecting the disease before symptoms appear. There is no effective treatment available and there is no known cure. Many disorders of the brain are genetic, neurologic or psyschiatric. Huntington's Disease is all of these.

CANNOT DESCRIBE Physical symptoms include uncontrollable jerking and twitching movements of the beed, neck, arms and legs, as well as abnormalities of gait. Speech becomes alurred.

Patients commonly show a progressive mental deterioration and often become mentally depressed or show marked personality changes as the disease progresses.


