### Trout opener just perfect

A perfect trout season opener; cool but not cold. There were excellent catches in some areas, and some large trout came to the net. Streams were at ideal levels with clear water conditions.

The Credit River was perfect with rain at noon to provide rising water conditions. This gets the fish

I talked to BRIAN HANMAN, a young teenager with a nice brown trout in the Credit near Glen Williams. The ponds at Terra Cotta conservation area were not stocked but I did not get the word until last week's column had gone to press. Terra Cotta and Belfountain were stocked earlier this week (or at least they were supposed to be).

Pond fishing should improve after this past weekend's good rains. New water will flush a pond and get things moving again. I noticed several fishermen using the wrong gear for trout. Some, I had the chance to work with, such as the young lad to whom I gave the correct type of lure. Right off he caught a nice Rainbow trout on it.

One major fault was the use of leaders while fishing for trout. Pike and muskles are the only fish that can bite through your line, so leaders are not necessary for trout fishing, and in fact will stop trout from biting or hitting a lure. Large hooks are also not needed, and this column has recommended the use of size 14 for trout on numerous occasions. Sinkers, if used, should be at least 12 inches from the hook, and many I saw were smack on top of it.

Horror of horrors, many fishermen did not have enough line on the reel. There is a distinctive sound of a caster with not enough line. Frustration is high and the reel SOUNDS like it is working too hard. Fill your reel to one eighth of an inch from the lip of the

This is not absolute, but near enough to get you started. This is one of the reasons I hold shows and open houses at such places as Canadian Tire. Use top line such as TRILINE and replace it often.

#### Chris Weldrick: 100 Backstroke 22nd; 100 Local boy just misses gold medal

Georgetown's Chris Somers bowled his way to a silver medal at the Canadlan Bantam Bowling Championships in Sudbury on the weekend.

Representing Southern Ontario, Somers, 12, finished the 12-man round robin tournament tied for first place with a record of 17 wins and 5 losses. In the championship bowl-off, the Georgetown lad lost out to Manitoba's Colin Tkach.

Tkach rolled a phonomenal 325 in the bowl-off, to top Somers' 248.

Somers averaged 220 pins per game throughout the tourney, an incredible mark in that his league average at the Georgetown Bowl is 179. Tkach told Somers after the final match that the

roll-off was the first time he had ever broken 300. Somers went out with class, too. It became obvious by the seventh frame of the bowl-off that Tkach had clinched the title, but the Georgetown boy showed the form that took him to the nationals in the first place.

### Ontario Tax Grants For Senior Citizens 1983 Instalments are in the Mail

Ontario Tax Grants for Seniors is a program designed specifically to help offset municipal and school taxes for Ontario residents 65 and over. The Ontario Ministry of Revenue is mailing cheques which comprise the first instalment of the 1983 Property Tax Grant of up to \$250 and a temporary Home Heating Grant of \$40. These cheques were molled on April 29th.

### Who will receive it?

- If you are 65 or over and own or rent your home, you are eligible for the Property Tax Grant.
- The 1983 instalment cheque is mailed to Ontario seniors who received the 1982 Property Tax Grant.
- This is intended to help you pay your property tax or rent for the first part of 1983. In the fall you will automatically receive an application for the balance of your grant.

### Who will not receive it?

Basically, if you didn't receive a 1982 Property Tax Grant, you will not receive the spring instalment. In particular, seniors should note that

If you reside in a nursing home, home for the aged or any property tax-exempt institution, you are not eligible for the Property Tax Grant.

If you turned 65 after December 31st, 1982 (and therefore did not qualify for a grant last year) you also will not receive the spring instalment. However, you will receive an application for the entire 1983 grant in the fall.


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
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
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
