Milton provide the Rangers, Metal Fabricators and Acton Villa, Eagles and Ajax and a new club from Guelph - Latines. The Latines are a south American outfit and should provide exciting competition. Eagles and Ajax are on a rebuilding programme having lost several players of last season. Varian are the other local representation and I understand a new coach is on the staff. Varian were a side who worked a lot, practised a lot and just could not put the results together in '82. Maybe this year.

Maybe this year also for the Blizzard. A terrific start with a solid victory over the dreaded Cosmos before an encouraging crowd of 24,000 augurs well. Old favorite Cliff Calvert popped in goal number one to set the way. The team shows promise and hopefully they can keep up last year's improvement.

Between them, the local teams set four meet records in six events, eventually ending up deadlocked for the team championship at 54 points apiece.

Stewarttown was awarded the meet title on the basis of better overall times. Other schools competing, in addition to second-place Centennial, included John Tuck, Pine-land, Sam Sherratt, Rolling Meadows and East-view.

Scott Lunn also set their record in the boys 4 x 400, coming home in 4:04:2.
