**Foot injured**

A 14-year old girl was treated and released from Georgetown Memorial Hospital when her left foot was caught underneath the left rear tire of a passing vehicle Monday at 9 p.m.

Julia Belleghem was out jogging on Sargent Road near Delrex Boulevard along the south edge of the westbound lane next to the median. The Georgetown driver was charged by Halton regional police.

**Man charged**

A Glen Williams man was charged with failure to remain at the scene of an accident after he caused \$7,000 damage to his 1979 GMC station wagon.

The man was driving north along the CNR spur tracks off John Street when the vehicle went off the roadway and struck trees. The car was left behind at 1:30 a.m. and the man arrested at 4:45 a.m.

The 29-year old man suffered minor facial injuries in the incident, Halton regional police said.

**Civilian heroes**

Who are the heroes in Halton? Halton regional police will point them out next Wednesday night when they pass out 24 civilian citations at the Bayrischer-Hof Restaurant in Milton.

Police week starts Monday with a major display up till May 21 at Oakville Place. Police equipment including cars and boats will be up for the public to inspect.

As well, there'll be audio-visual presentations on home and business security, Neighborhood Watch, and environmental design.

Long service awards will be presented to 11 officers.

**Fire warning**

If you're planning to burn debris around your home, keep in mind that you may have to pay the consequences if the fire gets out of control. Town fire chief Bill Cunningham told councillors last week that open fires can lead to charges.

Although the law may not be enforced the first time, letting the offender off with a warning, action will be taken in the future, Mr. Cunningham assured.

Coun. Pam Sheldon raised the issue about open fires, recalling that a week earlier, Milton and Campbellville firefighters were called out to check a serious open blaze near Speyside.

**Preventing abuse**

The "Sexual Abuse of Children" will be the focus of a free half-day public workshop May 16 from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., at the Howard Johnson Hotel in Oakville.

This regional project is being organized by the Halton Child Abuse Council, in conjunction with the Children's Services Co-ordinating Advisory Group and the Children's Aid Society.

Children may react in many different ways to sexual abuse. Radical changes in behavior, such as regression, self-abuse or exhibitionism are possible. Some victims may run; others may brood; still others may turn to drugs or alcohol. The character traits vary with each individual, but most carry the stigma for the rest of their lives.

The purpose of the workshop is to inform people of the success of Dr. Giaretto's treatment model and to explore the possibility of adopting such a model in Halton.

**POLICE BEAT**

A Brampton man is in satisfactory condition at Milton District Hospital following a car accident Friday at 4:30 a.m. on Halton Road 15 and Highway 25. Charles Whittaker, 34, is suffering a back injury.

He had been driving westbound on Halton Road 15 and drove straight off the road for no apparent reason, striking a small metal sign which indicated a curve in the road.

The car travelled approximately 12 metres over rough terrain, coming to a stop in some bush and small trees. There was \$300 damage to two caution signs and \$1,000 damage to the 1977 Chevrolet, Halton regional police report. No charges were laid.

An Acton man was treated and released from Milton District Hospital Thursday for minor injuries. Douglas Williams was brought to hospital by ambulance around 7:20 p.m. following a car accident.

A vehicle north on Tremaine Road in Milton lost control, hit the guard rail post, went into the east ditch and rolled over twice. Halton regional police said there was \$2,000 damage to the car and \$100 damage to the guard rails.

**Protest rejected**

While town council last week supported a borough of North York resolution calling for daylight saving time to begin in March, rather than April, it would not endorse comments from Hamilton's council about the Canadian economy.

Hamilton's resolution, addressed to Parliament and Queen's Park as well as to larger municipalities in the country agreed with statements made in January by a group of Catholic bishops examining the economy.

The resolution assails a "structural crisis in the international system of capitalism", one which maintains the "survival of the fittest" doctrine at the expense of poorer people.

Future economic strategies, the resolution says should "realize that the needs of the poor have priority over the wants of the rich" and that the rights of workers are more important than the "maximization of profit".

It also argues that technology, like profit, should be controlled; otherwise they'll "become the enemy of the people rather than allies in the development of peoples".
