JR 'out-boxes' contenders

To dog fanciers, "JR" means more than the conniving character on Dallas.

He's a four-year old boxer born and raised in Limehouse who tweaked a few whiskers in the canine community by galloping to a third place finish in the search for Canada's top boxer of

It's one more honor to add to the trophy and plaque shelf in the home of Ruth and Ian Kilner who live on the town line west of Ballinafad.

Mrs. Kilner has been raising boxers since the late 1960s. She entered her first show dog in 1971 and since then she has had a string of successes with dogs she's raised.

The "Limehouse" prefix added to the show names of her dogs denotes quality and pick from a litter of her dogs is pure gold to boxer enthusiasts.

DARTH'S SON JR's official name is "Limehouse Image: of vader" (after his father. "Darth Vader") and besides his Canadlan honors, he's on his way to being declared a champion in the U.S. as well. JR's carned best of winner awards in Michigan and Florida and he needs only four more of 15 points to get his American

championship status.

But his Dogs in Canada third best boxer award is something which Mrs. Kilner really cherishes and it's carefully pessed into a photo album chronicalling JR's achievements.

NOTEASY

It's not easy raising a show dog. It becomes quite a family affair, with Mrs. Kilner as the loving but thorough coach.

"I started training him at three months of age," Mrs. Kilner recalled. "We'd take him down to Union Station (in Toronto), walk him along University Avenue or jog along the Limehouse road where all the trucks are just to get him used to people and noise."

"There's a good 400 hours of roadwork on

Boxers are related to buildogs. The breed was developed, Mrs. Kilner explained, in the late 19th century.

At dog shows, you'll find boxers in the working group - dogs which are noted for the work they do or did do at some point in history.

BOAR HUNTERS Germans favored them for bull-baiting and boar hunting. The practice of cropping or trimming away part of their cars for shows comes from their history as boar hunt-

ing dogs; with shorter

clipped ears, there was

less chance of a boar grabbing hold and turning the chase around.

Having skipped puppy shows, Mrs. Kilner was ready to show JR at ten months of age, Judges look at such things as "stretch" - a particular profile with the rear legs

back a bit from the torso.

CIGAR-STUB And they also make sure that the short little cigar-stub tall characteristic of boxers, is straight up. Judges also turn their attention to how "wellfronted" the animal is, referring to the space between his front legs.

Even the snout is examined carefully, to make sure the nose is slightly higher than, the point where the snout meets the

Breeders are also consclous that judges like obedient well-behaved an-Imals.

Mrs. Kliner prefers to order her bitches from England. She says that British boxers are noted for even temper and she likes to be "sure of temperament more than anything".

They also tend to have nice thighs and feet, Mrs. Kilner added, noting that these, too, are things which judges will record at shows.

Halton Hills Baha'is decry ongoing persecution in Iran

The Baha'i Community of Halton Hills has learned recently of alarming new developments in the campaign of persecution being directed at their sister Baha'i community in Iran.

John Baldock, Chairman of the Baha'i community of Halton Hills said, "We recently learned that the supreme religious tribunal in Iran had approved the death sentences of 22 more Baha'is and that three more Baha'is were executed by hanging on March 12, including a woman."

"Now we have been told by Baha'l headquarters at the United Nations that the Iranian authorities, in an effort to further terrorize the Baha'i communily, will not release the names of those under sentence of death. Thus, even the 100 Baha'i prisoners in Shiraz do not know which ones among them have been condemned or who will be next. This barbaric psychological torture is reminiscent of Nazl tech-

niques." Mr. Baldock explained that the campaign of extermination is being carrled out by the clergy in blatant deflance of world opinion, as there have been many statements from the U.N., sovereign governments and humanitarian organizations condemning the regime's actions. Canada's own unanimous Parliamentary resolution of July 1980 was the first such statement by any government and was followed by several others, including both Houses of the U.S. Congress late last year.

Another member of the 'Halton Hills Baha'i community, secretary Isabelle Weaver explained to The Herald that the Baha'l Faith is an independent religion, with consultative status at the United Nations, which emphasizes the need for world unity and is characterized by such social teachings as the equality of men and women, unlversal education and the elimination of all forms of prejudice.

Of the 3-4 million Baha'is in the world today, 20,000 are Canadlans, one fifth of whom are of Indian or Inuit background. Some 300,000 Baha'is live in Iran, the
