

The Halton Hills Parks and Recreation Department will begin spending a \$7,735 federal grant this month towards educating the local population in summer water safety.

The funds will be spent on Project PAWS, Public Awareness of Water Safety. The town has already hired 19-year-old Gwyneth Gibb, an Acton student, to manage PAWS, and plans are for two more summer students to be hired.

The three students will work with the Georgetown Red Cross entering local public schools withprograms designed around teaching general water safety. Throughout the summer, they will also visit day camps and

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THE CRAFT CORNER

PRESERVE A LITTLE NATURE FOR YEAR-ROUND JOY

There is no better time for a walk in the park, the countryside or the garden than early spring and it's also one of the best seasons for collecting plant material to be used in dried weed and flower arrangements according to Hands Magazine of Canadian Crafts. Why not bring the outdoors in and preserve a little spring for year-round enjoyment?

To preserve weeds, bullrushes, teasel or branches of leaves or berries start collecting early while their cells will still absorb water. Hammer ends of branches until split. Place in a mixture of one part glycerine (available in drug stores) and three parts water as in a vase. Refill liquid as needed. Leave in glycerine mix until leaves show dampness of glycerine.

Set to dry. Leaves may need wiping occasionally. Use in an open arrangement. Glycerine preserved plant materials may mildew if stored airtight. Bullrushes can be picked in early

spring before seeds and white fuzz are

formed. Hang upside down to air dry. No other preservative is needed. If picked later in the season, however, builtrushes should 'be preserved using the glycerine method. And for future knowledge, fall leaves must be picked in August before

the frost has touched them and while chlorophyll is still flowing. Though they may lack the vivid hues of frost-touched leaves, they will have lovely soft brown and bronze tones. To find out more about nature and
