# Specters win opener 5-1

The Glen Specters are off to a flying start in their 1983 intercounty Fastball League schedule, dumping Orangeville 5-1 in their home opener Tuesday night.

The winning equation was a simple one for the Glen men. Add two overpowering pitching arms to one big offensive explosion to get two points in the standings.

Both starter Terry Haines and his reliever brot-

her Jeff dominated the opposition batters. Terry went five complete to get the win, allowing four hits while striking out four. Jeff came in and gave up the lone opposition run in the fifth, then shut the visitors down the rest of the way.

Jeff recorded seven strikeouts, while allowing just five hits.

The homerside did most of their offensive damage. In the bottom of the third, scoring four times. Centerfield Jackie Ber-

gman led off the inning by reaching on an error, then stealing second and third. Terry Haines walked behind Bergman, and stole second before shortstop Rob Hatcher delivered a two-run single up the middle.

Hatcher promptly stole second, and scored on another error.

Jeff Haines, who reached second base on the same play, came around to make it 4-0 when Andy Broadbent drilled a laser through the visiting third sacker's legs.

Broadbent doubled with two out to deliver the fifth Glen run in the fifth inning, after catcher Glen Fendley had singled and swiped second.

Glen manager Ted Wilkes was excited about the team's offensive output, an area he had already declared would be a weakness.

"The hitting is really starting to come," Wilkes said. "I think some of the guys just needed to get

some confidence in themselves."

Wilkes said he believed his players let down after forging a 5-0 lead, something he is willing to forgive early in the season.

"We don't need to play aggressively and end up with injuries this early in the season," he said.

The only tight spot for the Specters in their home opener came in the top of the eighth, when Jeff Haines gave up consecut-

ive singles to Rob Gerard, Ken Smith and Bob Little to load the bases with nobody out and the Specters leading 5-1.

Haines whiffed the next two batters he faced, though, and induced Tommy Cunningham to ground out, to douse the threat.

The Specters are in action tonight in Fergus, while they travel to Cambridge for a game Sunday night. Next Tuesday they host Alton at 8 p.m.
