Rebs run a strong second at Halton meet

At the Halton track and field championships in Etobicoke last Thursday the Georgetown District High School team placed a strong second, taking a back seat only to Burilngton's Nelson High School.

Twenty-six Georgetown athletes qualified in 48 events to go to the Peel-Halton championships in Etoblcoke tomorrow.

"It was what we had expected," said Rebel coach Karen Cosgrove. "Nelson has a very strong team, but we qualified more people for the Peel-Haltons than we have in years."

The powerful Rebel midget team played an important role in Georgetown's second place finish.

Midget Amy Powers took second place in the 800 meter, 1500 and the 3000 races. She was racing against the Ontario champion from Milton in all three events. Powers set a school record as the first, first-year midget to run under 11 minutes in the 3000.

Sandra Heaton finished second in the midget girls' 100. She took second in the midget girls' 400, setting a school record of 60 seconds. Heaton placed third in the midget girls' 200 and contributed to the fourth place finish of the junior girls' 4 x 400 and 4 x 100 relay teams.

Louis De Paoll dominated the midget boys' hurdles, equalling the Halton

record of 14.2 seconds.

Nancy Mustard was second in midget girls' hurdles, third in the 1500 and fourth

Jon Hammer won the midget boys' discus and was second in shot put. The junior team also had a number of outstanding performances. Jody Barwell won the junior girls' hurdles in 12.4 seconds, and Kim Dryden took first place in the junior girls' high jump.

"Lynn MacPhail completely dominated the junior girls' 3000 with the time of

10:39," said Rebel coach Donna Metcalfe. Chris Forguson won the junior boys' 1500 and Erik Hopkins was second. Hopkins won the junior boys' 3000 while Forguson took third. Susan Kristensen, "raced superbly" and won the senior girls' 3000. She

finished second in the 1500. Stacey Wheeler won his first senior boys' 2,000 steeple chase race while Harald Bransch was third in senior boys' steeple chase and second in high jump.

The boys' 4 x 400 relay team of Hen Hesse, Paul Burroughs, Chris Forguson

and Gary Hulbert placed second. Rich Stacey placed third in the junior boys' discus.

"We collected 342 points, which was more than we had expected, so we're quite pleased with that," said coach Cosgrove. Georgetown accumulated 70 more points than third place White Oaks.

"We're expecting to place in the top three at the reci-mations," says cosgrove. "We're a little weak in some field events. In some areas we have quality but not quantity," she says.

"This year our aim is to qualify some people for OFSSA. We'll be happy if we


can do that. I think we're going to peak next year," Cosgrove said.
Other contributors to Georgetown's point total include midget Anne Coulighan, who was fourth in the 3000; midget Jenni Lusby placed sixth in high jump; midget Mike Wood took third in the 3000, and fourth in the 1500; junior Flona Heaton took third in the 3000 and sixth in the 1500; Junior Lee Blendell placed fifth in the 400 and 100; junior Kara McGaw placed second in discus and sixth in javelin; junior Ken Hesse placed third in the 800 and sixth in the 400; junior Gary Hulbert placed fourth in the 400 and fourth in the 800; senior Jen Pepper was second in the 400 while Angle MacKey was fifth in the same event and fourth in the 800; senior Sandra Morciniuk was fourth in the 1500 and the 800; senior Leslie Bick was fifth in hurdles; senior Jack Harlow placed third in hurdles and fourth in triple jump; senior Paul Burroughs was fourth in javelin and sixth in the 400; and senior David Banks was sixth in 1500.

there are no new faces on Newest Raider GM

There is a fresh face in the Georgetown Chrysler Roider hierarchy this year, and it belongs to Doug Brindley.

Brindley, 33, has been announced as one of three Raider general managers for the upcoming season, their first as a Senior 'A' entry. His main area of responsibility will be recruiting players.

A resident of Georgetown for almost three years now, Brindley brings a wealth of hockey 'connections' to the Raider oullit.

Brindley played for the 1968 Memorial Cup champion Niagara Falls Flyers, and was a Toronto Maple Leaf first round draft pick the following year. After two years in Tulsa, he graduated to the Leaf roster as a center. playing behind such stars as Dave Keon, Norm Ullman, Jim Harrison and a young Darryl Sittler.

Ironically, Brindley was the most-valuableplayer at the 1963 Georgetown bantem hockey tournament, playing out of Walkerton.

The new GM was traded from Toronto to Vancouver, played 1972 in Rochester for Don Cherry, and signed with Cleveland in the World Hockey Association in 1974. He was drafted away by Indianapolis the next year, where he played with a scrawny 17year-old named Wayne Gretzky.

Brindley currently is an officer with the Ontario Provincial Police, stationed in Snelgrove.

"I've been wanting to get back into hockey, and I've been talking to Dave (vice-president Kentner) for a couple of years now," Brindley said. "I think I have some influence with a few fellows in the area who are just a year or two out of pro hockey, and I might be able to convince some of them to come here."

An old teammate of Brindley's is Rene Robert, once a 50-goal man on the famed French Connection line in Buffalo, and the Raiders are admittedly interested in Robert.

"I'm going to get as many hockey players coming here as I can," the Park Avenue resident promised. "I've already started making contacts."
