

Town changes position

Residents get their meeting

Residents in Glen Williams Wildwood Road area who have expressed concern over the future of a chunk of property in their neighborhood will be able to formally air their views at a public meeting May 30, the town's general committee has decided.

housing and municipal affairs.
In light of the strong bid by residents, Mayor Pomeroy said he recommended the meeting.
The land is owned by Meagan Developments Ltd. The firm hopes to build estate houses in the area which is located north of Wildwood Road and east of nearby Eighth Line. Included in the proposed secondary plan amendment, but not owned by Meagan, is a smaller parcel of land on the Meagan property's

western flank.

In a letter objecting to the housing affairs ministry about council's refusal to hold a public meeting, resident Craig Copeland said that while studies have been done on the Meagan land, no work has been carried out on the extra parcel.
At previous meetings, Wildwood residents have argued that more people have moved into the area since meetings were held regarding the Meagan land in 1978 and 1979.
New residents should

be able to add their comments to any land use changes in the area, they maintain.
Councillors have said that many of the resi-

dents' concerns about Meagan's housing proposal will be dealt with when the firm presents a draft plan of subdivision.
The meeting will begin at 7 p.m.
