### Check rules

With the PIKE season open, there are now enough fish species available that if one does not work out, there is always another.

Walleye fishing in some areas is open and the fishing has been reasonable. Some good catches have been reported in areas around Peterborough, and the water is so high that even the MOON RIVER area should have good fish stocks coming in. The Walleye fishing in the Moon is dependent on the amount of water the Hydro people allow over the falls. The last few years the waters have been down at the season opener and the fish just have not been there.

Check the Ontario summary of the fishing regulations for new dates for openers, and make sure you are not fishing in a newly set up sanctuary. Pike fishing in lakes such as Fairy Lake in ACTON is excellent at this time of year with emerging vegetation. Fish the "bars" and "humps" where the weed is showing. The deeper parts of the lake do not have weed growth at this time that is sufficient to provide an interest for fish. Even the new growth can hold lots of fish and often the largest you will take during the year.

Use spinner baits and weedless spoons such as the Johnson Silver Minnow. Use a pork trailer on this lure and fish it right in amongst the "cabbage". Just remember to put ALL the bass back as they also will hit a lure at this time of year. The bass season is not open for some time yet. Fish fairly slow, and just over the tops of the new weeds.

Lots of activities at our Conservation areas. Terra Cotta has ponds stocked, although they only stocked 1,000 this year. Maybe a little pressure will get them to stock better and more often.

Kortright has their BEE SPACE program each weekend and that is exciting. It is where I first got the push to put me into beekeeping.

One idea that occurred to me has proved excellent and was in the last issue of Ontario Outdoors magazine under my byline. Triple header catfish. Use your three way spreader that you use for ice fishing. Bait the three hooks and fish in a likely catfish hole. Three at a time is exciting.

A member of the Halton Hills Jills for three years now, Tracy has been busy sharpening her style with the pre-competitive club, waiting her chance to move up to the competitive team.

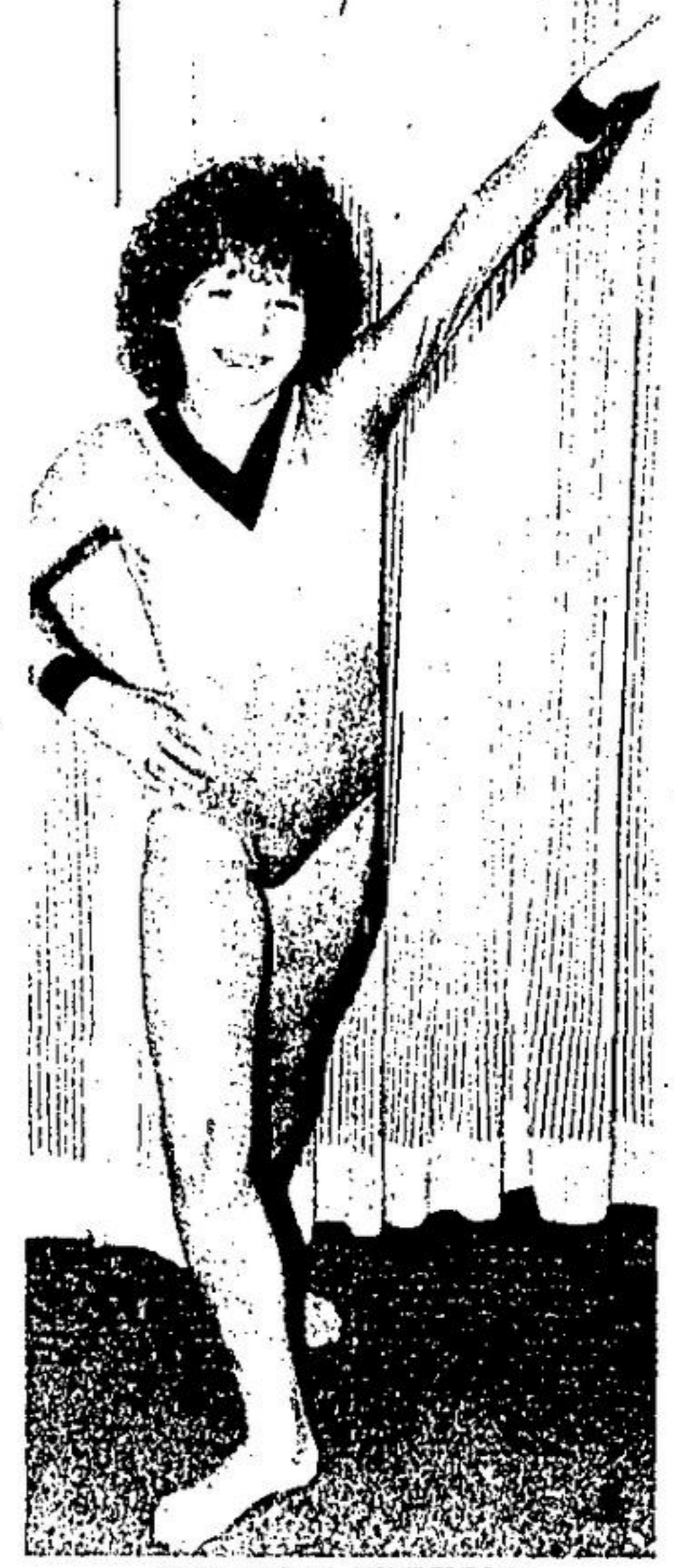
