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# Hydro office staying put

Acton residents were promised their local hydro office won't be closed despite rumors to the contrary.

The rumors were fueled by a local newspaper story detailing the move of a computer terminal from the Acton office to Georgetown along with the loss of a cashler to receive bill payments.

The promise to keep the office open was given by two hydro commissioners - Doug Mason and Murt Allison - at a public meeting held Thursday. Mr. Mason blamed the

computer on the recom-

decision to transfer the

eral manager Gerry Trudell. Both Mr. Mason and Mr. Allison, who is the commission vice-chairman, admitted to knowing little or nothing about computers and relying on Mr. Trudell's advice. Mr. Mason sald he didn't know exactly how much money Mr. Trudell figured the move would save the-commission.

Mr. Allison said the

Georgetown hydro facility was too small several years ago when the commission was keeping virtually all its supplies and rolling stock at that site along with its office func-

tions. When the Acton and mendation of Hydro gen-Georgetown commissions amalgamated it was decided to try to keep both sites occupied. The opera-

tions outlet was moved to Acton and has been here already for a year or more while the office funtion is carried out in Georgetown. Mr. Allison viewed the

moving of the computer as an internal move which wouldn't really affect resident's ability to pay their bills locally. He said the possibility has been raised of moving the cashier who handles hydro payments into the municipal office. Since that office is on the main

street and many people visit for other municipal matters, he suggested that solution might prove suitable.

Residents, however, disagreed. Half a dozen speakers in the audience expounded on the symbol-

ism of moving that cashier out of the separate building specifically built for hydro purposes 13

years ago. Loss of the ability to pay hydro bills locally is another errosion in the quality of life which people were seeking in coming to a small town, Bruce Shoemaker sald.

## Campers arm against trouble 🖣

Halton regional police were called to Breezes Trailer Park in Acton Sunday at 12:20 a.m. by the campgrounds manager who reported a group of people roaming through the park with baseball bats.

Police said manager Robert Mairs also reported hearing a shot fired.

Arriving at the campgrounds, police observed approximately 30 people milling around, most of whom were campers armed with pieces of

wood and baseball bats. They had been told youths were going to come into the park looking for trouble, police said. Rather than calling police, the campers decided to arm themselves. Staff Sgt. Les Graham said.

Police apprehended nine teenagers in the park as trespassers. The youth said they were taking a shortcut through the park into Acton. No charges

were laid. No firearms were located at the site.

Overnight Friday, four vehicles parked on the grounds were broken into and ownership and insurance papers were taken from them, Staff Sgt. Graham said.

Police are investigating the incidents at the park.

## Golden Horseshoe waste site chosen

The chance that Halton Hills will become a site for a planned industrial liquid waste disposal facllity has been "completely eliminated", Mayor Pete Pomeroy told town council Monday night.

Last January, the Ontarlo Waste Management Corporation (OWMC) - a provincial crown corporation announced that it would be looking for a site in the Golden Horseshoe area of Lake Ontarlo. In this industrial belt.

almost 70 per cent of the province's liquid industrial wastes are produced. At a press conference

last month, OWMC chairman Donald Chant said that the search for a site had been narrowed to Milton and the northern part of Oakville, southern Brampton and parts of the Niagara Peninsula.

Mayor Pomeroy said he attended recent meetings in Hamilton outlining the OWMC's plans and was told that "because of geotechnical reasons, Halton Hills is not a desirable place at all" for a disposal site.

The province wants to burn the waste and then bury the residue in monitored landfill sites.

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
