Key-Copland deserve vote of thanks

To the editor of The Herald:

Ken Key and Craig Copland deserve a vote of thanks from the residents of Glen Williams for bringing to light the suspicious manner in which the proposed development in the Eighth Line-Wildwood Road area has been handled by Halton Hills Council.

While Mr. Key was able to pose a number of important questions at the recent public meeting he was not provided with any answers. This certainly warrants a further full public meeting on the Issue.

What is alarming however is the extent to which the proposed development will affect the residents in the lower Glen Williams area. Firstly, the necessity to totally reconstruct Wildwood Road, from the Eighth Line to Preston's store, will mean the loss of portions of property and trees to a number of Glen residents.

The traffic volumes through the Glen will increase dramatically and so will vehicle speeds and the likelihood of accidents. (the Glen is already used as a by-pass for truck traffic travelling from one side of Georgetown to the other).

Drainage run-off from the developed area will be fed into the Glen increasing the chances of flooding when heavy rainfall occurs.

The way of life of residents and the character of Glen Williams is being threatened by the proposed development.

The studies and decisions of Halton Hills Council should reflect honest and serious consideration for those residents who would be most affected Tony Taylor, by any development in the area. Glen Williams.


Also, it should be noted that concern over the matter is not restricted solely to residents adjoining or very close to the area in question. Subsur-

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




SPIT'N POLISH

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
