POLICE BEAT

There was \$9,500 damage to two cars and a hydro pole, and two drivers were injured in an accident Friday at 1 a.m. Marianne Creary, 30, of Georgetown was taken to Georgetown Memorial Hospital where she was treated and released for minimal injuries.

Arnold Hoffmann, 42, of Moffatt was also treated and released from hospital for minor injuries. Both vehicles were westbound along Guelph Street in Norval, just east of Mary Street.

The second car struck the rear of the first, causing it to be pushed across the eastbound lane, over a sidewalk, and into a hydro pole which broke from the bottom. The second driver was charged with careless driving.

A 40-year old Georgetown driver was treated for minimal injuries Thursday night following a two-car collision causing \$2,400 damage.

A driver coming out of the I.G.A. parking lot struck a Guelph Street driver proceeding north, on the right rear fender and door.

The driver was charged with failing to yield the right of way. William Ernest Aiken was treated and released.

Edwin Hall, 68, was treated and released for minimal injuries following a two-car collision Friday afternoon. A southbound vehicle on Main Street stopped for a stop sign, then entered west on Maple Avenue, colliding with an oncoming car.

There was \$1,400 damage to the two cars. The driver was charged with failing to yield the right of way.

Forget France

Surfacing from its past, Norval's Riviera Club is taking shape once again. And its promoters and managers have every intention of turning the large, futuristic complex by the shores of the Credit River into the Ontario's "fun spot" as it was often referred to during its heyday in the 1960s and 1970s.

The property is ideally located between Brampton and Georgetown and has plenty of parking off Highway 7, just east of the Winston Churchill Boulevard intersection.

Currently being redeveloped by a Brampton firm, the Riviera will be the "umbrella" name of two distinct and separately managed business ventures, both geared to enhancing the leisure time activities of interested patrons. While details are still sketchy, there are plans to bring dancing back to the stylish, pagoda-like structure which has made the property a curiosity since the Riviera was constructed about 23 years ago.

Most recently, the dance hall, designed by architect John Ma in 1961, was used for several tapings of CFGM's Opry North and for a number of Sunday's last year new and veteran country music artists twanged out numbers from the spacious sunken dance floor, surrounded by two tiers. But it's been closed for several months and the structure is currently being renovated.

HEALTH CLUB
A health club was added in the early 1970s and the Way Jay in the late seventies became noted for featuring some fine rock and roll entertainment in the Toronto area.

Now, under the name of the Burgundy Club, the health centre is to be reopened.

Manageress Fern Wolf and a crew of eager workers have been refurbishing the interior, which includes an indoor swimming pool, lounge, sauna and lots of space for exercise. Progress is brisk. Fern hopes to open for the summer fitness crowd, with a liquor licence in place by the end of July.

The Burgundy Club will be open seven days a week, she told The Herald. At the moment she's offering a special two for one opening special for charter club members - a \$300 membership allows two people to use the

facilities for a full year. And those facilities will be pretty extensive: tennis courts in the back of the property are being fixed.

The outdoor pool is being drained of gallons of rainwater and is due for a sandblasting shortly. When it's finished, club members will be able to have a dip after a brisk workout on the courts or in the exercise areas.

Fern hopes to start group and personal fitness programs for men and women. Other recreation activities planned for the near future, include badminton and volleyball.

She'll be offering quarterly memberships for \$100 and semi-annual memberships for \$175. A day membership of \$10 will also be offered. Members will be allowed dis-

count tennis court fees as well.

Other recreational activities are also planned to make full use of the 6.5 acres of land surrounding the Riviera.

A jogging track will hopefully circle the property. There's room for an archery range and lots of winter sports, like skating, cross country skiing and sponge hockey.

Inside, Fern has plans for a traditional piano bar

and sees the lounge enclosing the indoor pool. (In one part of the bar, the part which will be conveniently close to the piano, there's a large stone fireplace - great for following up outdoor workouts in the fall or winter).

School programs dropped locally

Family studies and industrial arts courses currently offered at Centennial and McKenzie-Smith Public Schools are to be dropped for Grade 6 students.

Halton board of education trustees voted to delete the courses at the Grade 6 level to save \$47.34 per pupil.

The 1983-84 cost of Grade 6 pupils now receiving family studies-industrial arts courses is estimated to be \$107,215 in the region.

Six classes or 169 Grade 6 students at Centennial, and four classes or 119 Grade 6 students at McKenzie-Smith are projected for 1983.

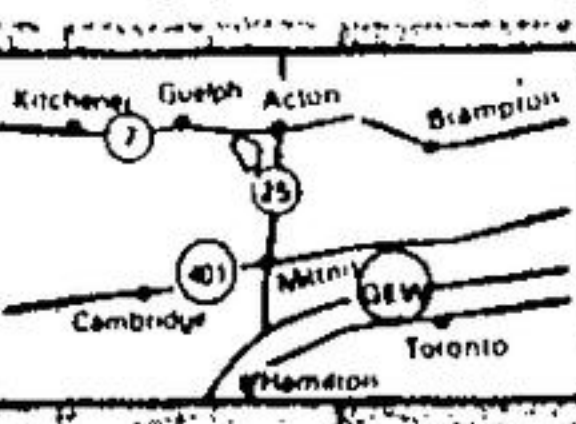
