Interspersed were readings by Gladys Cromer of Georgetown who kept everyone smiling with her wit and humour and a violin solo by two choir members.

Mrs. Marshall accompanied on piano by her sister M. Nidderly. The opening worship service for the evening was given by the Senior members of Unit 1 from Norval U. Church, which was prepared by Dorothy McLean.

Libraries start collecting fines

During a comprehensive review of the Library Board's financial responsibilities and policies begun at the May Board meeting the trustees voted to re-instate a policy of collecting fines on overdue materials which was dropped several years ago as an experimental measure.

The original reasons for eliminating fines were centered around the hope that the absence of fines would encourage more people to bring back books that were apparently being withheld in an attempt to avoid the payment of the fine.

Another reason stemmed from the fact that the old manual circulation control system did not permit easy identification or consistency in dealing with delinquent patrons.

The no-fines policy does not seem to have accomplished its objective in any striking way. Many patrons never adjusted to the fact that there were no fines. Additionally, the automated control system has now made it

possible to follow through with fines administration and results in a more equitable application of the policy.

During the discussion the Board members admitted one of their objectives was to find sources

of revenue and that re-introducing fines as a penalty for abuse of the system was preferable to introducing other fees which would be penalizing legitimate use of library services.

The Board's motion indicated that the re-introduction of fines would commence on July

1st; that the fine would be 10 cents per day up to a maximum of \$1.50 per item and that this change in policy would be announced in local newspapers for three weeks beforehand.

The Board further agreed that renewal requests must still be handled in person at the library.
