## Libraries start collecting fines

During a comprehensive review of the Library Board's financial responsiblities and policies begun at the May Board meeting the trustees voted to re-instate a policy of collecting fines on overdue materials which was dropped several years ago as an experimental

The original reasons for eliminating fines were centered around the hope that the absence of fines would encourage more people to bring back books that were apparently being withheld in an attempt to avoid the payment of the fine.

Another reason stemmed from the fact that the old manual circulation control system did not permit easy identification or consistency in dealing with delinquent patrons.


