The Magforce will cast a lure without line tangle, and that's something even for the newer casting reels that have hit the market over the last few years. Magforce comes in four different sizes ranging from eight, 10 and 12 pound test line to 14, 20 and 25 pound test line. Pick the one for your type of fishing and enjoy it for the rest of your life.

My "old" Diawa Millionaire casting reel has been through the fishing wars with me and is still as good as new. The Procaster has a finger pickup of the line and the ball together. This makes it a one-hand operation and no manual lifting of the bail, unless you want to. Also keep an eye on the Diawa Underspin series, as they are dynamite.

Stories of fish caught on Mepps were prevalent last weekend. It seems that everyone uses Mepps and catches fish with them. The newer flourescent spinners are hot for the large trout of Georgian Bay, and Walleye hit them with a fury.

But the big news is the newer Nils Maste plugs. These hit the market last year, and the one I gave to Dale Wood of Glendale Charters took Muskie for him when nothing else would do. Another convert to Nills Master plugs. It's still a little hard to get anything new that is really good. Be dilligent and keep an eye out for them.

Fish from shore with a seven inch Rapala in blue. Boat fishermen should use spinner baits or Johnson silver minnows in the weed beds. Tip the above noted lure with a plastic tail or a pork rind. Use Uncle Josh pork chunks or strips for hot action.

Fairy Lake in Acton needs a shot of bass in the form of stocking and then some hard control of the duck and goose population in order to get it back to the great fishing lake it once was.

However or wherever you fish, good luck, and please let me know how you did. I will be fishing the famous Mirimichi river in New Brunswick for salmon at the time you read this.


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
